Look for delegate petitions in the mail

Preparations are being made for the 2017 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Fort Worth, Texas. Forms to nominate delegates to the annual meeting will be mailed to every active life and regular member of the Association who qualifies as

an eligible voting member prior to April 7 according to the Bylaws.

The nomination period is April 10-June 9. Each eligible voting member is allowed to nominate one eligible voting member who resides in the same state or district, including himself or herself. The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Signed nomination forms must be received in the Association office no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT on June 9, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to all eligible voting members in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition, please return it promptly.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC- Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).

Other activities include the Western States queen competition, junior showmanship contest, educational program, junior social, WNAF Committee meeting, and both board and general membership meetings of the Western States Angus Association.

Foundation scholarship applications available

The Angus Foundation will award a number of undergraduate and graduate scholarships this year. Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the 2017 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Des Moines, Iowa. The eligibility requirements for the general Angus Foundation scholarships remain the same. Angus youth who are graduating from high school or in college currently may also be eligible for other Angus-related scholarships that are permanently endowed and managed by the Angus Foundation.

The Foundation will also make available graduate student scholarships to young men and women actively involved in the Angus breed who are pursuing advanced degrees.

Applicants must have at one time been a National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the Association. Strong preference and priority will be given to applicants pursuing advanced degrees related closely to the beef industry.

Applications being accepted for 2017 BLI

Applications for the 10th annual Beef Leaders Institute (BLI) June 19-23 are now being accepted. BLI is designed for American Angus Association members 25-45 years old as a means to provide participants insight to all segments of the beef industry. Attendees will be stronger, more effective leaders for the Angus breed and for the beef industry now and in the future.

The Angus Foundation and Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) will provide transportation, lodging, meals and materials during the BLI. Attendees will be responsible for round-trip transportation between their home and the beginning and ending points.

The BLI is limited to 20 attendees each year. Applications are available online or by contacting the Events and Education Department at 816-383-5149. March 1 is the application deadline. Those reading the digital version of the *Angus Journal* (available about 10 days before it hits mailboxes) still have time to apply.

Important junior information

A comprehensive booklet was mailed to active Angus junior members in January, including show schedules, rules and entry forms. This booklet includes information about regional preview shows, regional shows, the NJAS and the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) Conference.

Beginning in 2017, the NJAA Code of Conduct will be established for all NJAA members. The NJAA Code of Conduct is a set of guidelines for junior members that defines the expectations for junior actions and specifies consequences that could be enforced if the code is violated. Each NJAA member, along with a parental guardian(s), will need to read, sign and submit the NJAA

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Code of Conduct prior to participation in the individual's first NJAA-sponsored show or conference of the year.

Allied Angus Breeders Scholarship

The Angus Foundation Board of Directors approved funds to provide \$1,000 scholarships to three youth who use Angus genetics in their seedstock or commercial operations. Awards will be given out in July 2017.

Applicants must be enrolled in a junior college, four-year college/university or other accredited institution for the fall of 2017. They can be an entering freshman or a continuing student in any undergraduate program. The applicant or applicant's parents/guardians must have transferred or been transferred an Angus registration paper in the last 36 months.

Single-step evaluation testing continues

AGI continues to test single-step genetic evaluation, the method the company plans to soon implement in order to calculate the American Angus Association weekly expected progeny differences (EPDs).

This is an ongoing effort and the top

priority for AGI. Therefore, the Association plans to move to this updated statistical model only after thorough internal measures are complete. AGI will continue to finetune the required software to ensure the procedures used for implementation offer the utmost accuracy and valuation for members.

Meanwhile, the Association will rely on the current Angus genetic evaluation based on the latest calibration released late last year, which is the largest and most accurate beef genomic calibration ever conducted in the global beef cattle industry.

While AGI continues to refine the single-step methodology for targeted implementation in spring 2017, Angus breeders can be confident the current evaluation provides the most accurate, comprehensive values available.

Madison, Wis., to host 50th NJAS

The NJAA will celebrate a major milestone in 2018 as it hosts the 50th NJAS in Madison, Wis. The annual event is a summer highlight for many Angus juniors and their families, and the American Angus Association is proud of the young leaders it has encouraged over the past five decades.

The 50th NJAS will take place July 7-13, 2018, at the Alliant Energy Center. Participants will notice a change in the

schedule, which begins on Saturday and ends on Friday.
