The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC– Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).

The winner will be notified in October 2016, and the scholarship presented during the Angus Convention Nov. 5-7 in Indianapolis, Ind. Applications will be judged on the participant's future career path, passion for beef cattle and leadership experiences within the industry.

To be eligible, the applicant or applicant's parents or guardians must have transferred or have been transferred a registration paper in the last 36 months (on or after May 1, 2013). They must also have an affiliate member code or a current membership with the American Angus Association, and must be enrolled in the Future Angus Stockmen program. Applications are available online and must be postmarked by Sept. 16.

Consign bulls to the NWSS Bull Sale

The Association is accepting consignments for the 2017 National Western Angus Bull Sale at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo. The sale is set for Wednesday, Jan. 11, and producers can save \$100 by acting now.

Consignments received on or before Sept. 15 carry an entry fee of \$400 per head. From Sept. 16 through the Oct. 1 entry deadline, the fee is \$500 per head. All bulls consigned must be entered in the NWSS. In addition, bulls must be genomic-trait-tested and possess a complete set of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and dollar value indexes (\$Values). Bulls born before Jan. 1, 2016, must have passed a complete breeding soundness examination (sometimes referred to as a BSE), including both physical and semen, within 30 days of the sale.

The Sale Bull Show will start at 8 a.m. in the Stadium Arena. The three-person committee of Kyle Gillooly, Wadley, Ga.; Andy Musgrave, Pittsfield, Ill.; and Jim Vietheer, Wilton, Calif., will place the bulls using a composite system. There will be no individual classes in the show. The judges will be asked to place the bulls in each division only to assist in making the sale order. No rankings will be published.

Prospective buyers in attendance will be invited into the showring to inspect the bulls after the grand and reserve grand champions have been selected. CONTINUED ON PAGE 18
