Spring Sire Evaluation online this month

The spring 2009 Sire Evaluation Report will be online later this month at www.angussiresearch.com.

The report will be online by Monday, Dec. 15. Accessing the report online is the fastest and easiest way to get the latest performance information on sires in the Angus breed. It allows you to specify ranges of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and to sort bulls that qualify in those ranges. This evaluation also includes the dollar value indexes (\$Values), expressed in dollars per head, to assist commercial beef producers in selection decisions.

Active members who returned their blue request cards to receive a printed copy of the fall 2008 report will receive the spring 2009 report automatically. All other members and

Foundation Heifer Package to sell in Denver

Chris McCutchen, owner of Limestone LLC, Perkins, Okla., will donate the 2009 Angus Foundation Heifer, set to sell Jan. 15, 2009, at the NWSS.

Limestone Rita T754 is chosen to represent the Limestone program. She is a daughter of the featured Limestone LLC and Express Ranches sire Raven, the breed's eighth-ranked young sire for ribeye area (REA).

The dam of Rita T754 is a direct daughter of the \$450,000-valued and former breed leader for intramuscular fat (IMF), Prime Time 2409, sired by the \$75,000 Rito 1I2. Rita R379, the dam of this special donor prospect, was the \$220,000 one-time, world-record-selling open heifer selected by Monarch Farms and Collins Angus through the 2006 Limestone LLC Sale, where her maternal sister Rita R391 was the \$440,000 top-selling female.

The sale of the Angus Foundation Heifer Package, an annual fundraising tradition initiated in 1980, supports the Angus Foundation, the not-for-profit affiliate of the American Angus Association that funds and supports programs involving education, youth and research in the Angus breed and agricultural industry.

In addition to the heifer, the buyer receives:

- ▶ 30 days of free insurance from American Live Stock Insurance Co., Geneva, Ill.;
- ► free transportation to the buyer's ranch



- provided by Lathrop Livestock Transportation, Dundee, Ill.; and
- ► an Advanced Reproductive Technology Package from Trans Ova Genetics, Sioux Center. Iowa.

Foundation to sponsor YCC participant

Still time for 'end-of-the-year' charitable gifts

As a reminder, one should pay special attention to timing when it comes to yearend gifts. In accordance with Internal Revenue Service (IRS) guidelines, 501(c)(3) charities such as the Angus Foundation will recognize the U.S. Postal Service's postmark denoted on the outside of the carrier envelope used by the donor in transmitting the gift to the charity.

In order to qualify for tax savings on this year's tax return, your gift must be completed by Dec. 31. For cash gifts, this means your gift must be personally delivered or mailed to the Angus Foundation in an envelope postmarked no later than Dec. 31. Gifts can be made online at www.angusfoundation.org. Donors will be recognized for their support to the Vision of Value: Campaign for Angus, which aims to raise \$11 million by Dec. 31, 2011.
