With this new partnership, our net income for the project this year was almost \$3,000 — a 438% increase compared to 2011. The Auxiliary gets a percentage of every CAB gift box sold via www.angusauxiliary.com or www.certifiedangusbeef.com. The proceeds of this project are used to enhance our junior Angus scholarship and awards programs. My compliments and thanks go to CAB and to committee co-chairwomen Jane Ebert and Mary Greiman.

A big part of our story is our first-ever Women Connected Conference, which took place last spring in Saint Joseph, Mo. Made possible by the sponsorship of the Angus Foundation and the support of the American Angus Association, we connected with a diverse group of women from different regions of the country and backgrounds that are connected by and share a common bond — Angus cattle. Participants first submitted applications, and from those applicants, 20 women were selected to join the Auxiliary executive committee to engage one another in conversation and friendship, and to empower leadership and educate themselves in a variety of relevant topics.
