The Tradition Continues Heifer program is one that is very special to this group. The program has a long history within this organization and allows us to provide so many opportunities to Angus youth. The American Angus Auxiliary first created the scholarship program in 1955 to provide recognition and an award to an outstanding girl. The first heifer given to improve the scholarship fund was in 1958. P.L. Benshoof of Treasure Acres Farm in Blairsburg, Iowa, donated the heifer, which was auctioned during The All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity at Lexington, Ky. The Auxiliary Futurity Heifer became a tradition that lasted until 1996.

#### Revival

After an absence of several years, the heifer program was brought back to life in 2011 through the generous donation of a heifer from Jim and Ardyce O'Neill of O'Neill Angus Farm, Logan, Iowa. The heifer sold to Greg Buie of Copan, Okla. In 2012, Gardiner

Angus Ranch of Ashland, Kan., donated the heifer that was purchased by French River Cattle Co. of Ont., Canada. Last year, Tom McGinnis of Heritage Farm, Shelbyville, Ky., purchased EXAR Rita 5681. This bred heifer was generously donated by Express Ranches, Yukon, Okla.

This program is now appropriately dubbed "The Tradition Continues Heifer." Through generous donations of outstanding heifers, the Auxiliary is able to continue its rich tradition of awarding scholarships and awards to deserving Angus youth. We are honored to work with Angus breeders who share our passion for recognizing excellence and achievements in the future of this breed.
