Manhattan selected for DHS facility

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released its final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the National Bio and Agro-Defense Facility (NBAF) Dec. 5, recommending Manhattan, Kan., as the preferred site for the state-of-theart, high-security laboratory facility to study foreign animal and zoonotic (transferable from animal to human) diseases that can affect livestock.

While a formal Record of Decision will officially designate a site this month, officials are expected to follow the Manhattan recommendation. The facility design is set to begin in 2009, with plans for construction to begin in 2010. It is expected that the NBAF would be operational by 2015.

The NBAF will replace the current facilities at the Plum Island Animal Disease Center (PIADC) off the New York coastline. (To learn more read "Plum Island" or "Tug of War Over Animal Disease Research" available at www.angusjournal.com.).

TB identified in Indiana

The Indiana State Board of Animal Health (BOAH) announced Dec. 2 it is investigating a case of bovine TB in a beef cattle herd in southeastern Indiana. The TB-positive cow was identified through routine testing at a meat-processing facility in Pennsylvania.

Indiana's bovine TB-free status will remain under federal guidelines. The last time an Indiana herd tested positive for the disease was in the 1970s.

U.S. cattle on feed down 7%

Cattle and calves on feed for harvest in the United States for feedlots with capacities of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.0 million head Nov. 1, 2008. The inventory was 7% below Nov. 1, 2007, figures and 8% below Nov. 1, 2006, figures.

Placements in feedlots during October totaled 2.44 million head, 11% below 2007 figures but slightly above 2006 figures. Net placements were 2.37 million head.

Marketings of fed cattle during October totaled 1.81 million head, 3% below 2007 figures but 3% above 2006 figures.

Other disappearance totaled 67,000 head during October, 43% above 2007 figures but 17% below 2006 figures.
