n anticipated 6,000-7,000 cattlemen will mosey on down, up or over to Music City Feb. 1-3 for the beef industry's largest gathering of the year. Featuring the joint and individual meetings of five industry organizations — the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA), the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion & Research Board (CBB), the American National CattleWomen (ANCW), CattleFax and the National Cattlemen's Foundation (NCF) the 120th annual Cattle Industry Convention and NCBA Trade Show will be convened at the Gaylord Opryland Hotel in Nashville, Tenn.

Convention participants will hear from industry leaders, gather insight on industry trends, and enjoy an evening of stars and guitars at the Country Music Hall of Fame, as well as an exclusive event at the famous Grand Ole Opry. NCBA President Tracy Brunner says the convention is a must for everyone involved in the cattle industry.


"The Cattle Industry Convention is the oldest and largest national convention in the cattle business," Brunner explains. "We look forward to another great meeting in a great location for cattle producers."

CattleFax will present its U.S. and Global Protein & Grain Outlook seminar Thursday, Feb. 2. Always a highlight of the convention, speakers will address factors driving the market, including a look at coming supplies and protein demand domestically and internationally. Art Douglas will present his long-term weather forecast.

The American National CattleWomen (ANCW) will host its annual meetings Jan. 30-31. Activities feature a CattleWomen's Leadership and Education session beginning at 9:30 a.m. Jan. 30, featuring Donnell and Kelli Brown of R.A. Brown Ranch, Throckmorton, Texas. Tuesday's general membership meeting will feature Marji Guyler-Alaniz, president and founder of



FarmHer. The effort was founded in 2013 to begin to change the image of agriculture to include women in that image through photographs and stories.

Keynote addresses

As the opening general session keynote speaker, Beck Weathers will share his story of surviving one of the most violent and deadly storms in the history of Mount Everest. The storm claimed the lives of eight other climbers. Weathers will share the lessons he learned during his ordeal and the appreciation he found for getting a second chance as he encourages others to cherish every moment in life.

Weathers shares "Miracle on Everest" at the opening general session Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 1.

Dana Perino, former press secretary for President George W. Bush and current cohost of Fox News's *The Five*, will share her insights and stories for an entertaining look at politics today. With an insider's knowledge, Perino is particularly adept at depicting how politics affects people outside the Beltway. She shares what organizations need to know about politics.
