Leading by example, she promotes

proper conduct in meetings and encourages use of parliamentary procedure. Rieff makes sure officers and members understand the importance of conducting an efficient meeting.

Rieff always shows passion in working with juniors and includes even the youngest members. "She has never made them feel like they are too little to be included," says Sheri Tunstill, Fayetteville, Ark. Her daughter Katlyn was only 4 years old when Rieff started her advising term.

"She wanted us to know even though we were younger that our ideas and thoughts were important," Katlyn says. "This helped me gain confidence in myself at a very young age."

In addition to her involvement with the Arkansas Junior Angus Association, Rieff is currently serving as the 2008 American Angus Auxiliary president-elect. She continues to be active
