> of your hand. If you're at a show or a sale, and you want to learn more about the offering, it's right there with you.

In addition, the MyHerd function allows access to AAA Login, where users can search their herd inventory, view performance records

of their cattle and enter calving book records.

The Angus Mobile app also has a gestation calculator and table and weekly National

Cattle Evaluation (NCE) reports, as well as Beef Improvement Records (BIR) data like Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®).
