This summer Angus Genetics Inc., along with partnering labs Zoetis and GeneSeek,

announced an exciting development that could further open the channels for an increased number of cattlemen and women to more rapidly identify superior genetics. The lower-cost, low-density (LD) tests offered makes testing more animals feasible and, therefore, easier to improve accuracy for selection processes through genomic-enhanced expected progeny differences (GE-EPDs). More information is readily available in the pages of the July Angus Journal's "By the Numbers" column, but it merits additional mention here. I'm excited to see what this capability, and the continuous research efforts funded through the Angus Foundation hold for our future.

Tomorrow

By nearly all business and technological measures, Angus is poised for further success. Even more encouraging, though, are the many young people witnessed by the crowd at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Tulsa, Okla.

This energetic, youthful group shares a passion for the breed that inspires and renews our sense of why we do what we do.
