## NJAS Teaches Youth Carcass Value

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The carcass contest helps Angus juniors see a bigger picture of the beef industry.

undreds of quality Angus cattle made the trip to Kansas City, Mo., for this year's National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), but the steers entered in the carcass contest never made the trip into the showring. The contest, sponsored by Briarwood Angus Farms, is geared toward giving juniors a chance to analyze the animals' carcass data after processing and learn about the end product of the industry — beef.

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National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members weighed their steers and sent them to an area processing plant. The animals were ranked according to carcass merit, and the top steers were announced as part of the NJAS awards ceremony July 10 at the American Royal Complex.

"As with all of our NJAA contests, the educational value for our Angus youth participating in the NJAS Carcass Steer Contest is immeasurable," says Milford Jenkins, Angus Foundation president. champion carcass steer. His 1,310-pound (lb.) steer sired by Bohi Rito 2 878 Rito 7019 had a 3.0 yield grade (YG) with a low-Prime quality grade (QG). He earned a premium \$175.98 on the contest grid.

Wyatt Schumann, Lecompton, Kan., had the reserve champion carcass steer. The 1,290-lb. steer sired by EXAR Franchise 8687 graded average Choice with a YG 2.8, earning a premium of \$168.80.

In the bred-and-owned (B&O) carcass steer division, Elizabeth Otte, Saint Mary, Mo., won grand champion. The 1,370-lb. steer sired by SS Fast Track M719 graded average-Choice with a 3.3 yield grade, earning a premium of \$134.40.

took home the reserve champion B&O carcass steer honors. Her 1,130-lb. steer sired by OSU Currency 8173 graded average-Choice with a 2.5 yield grade, bringing a premium of \$123.21.

"I enjoy the carcass contest because it gives the steers kind of a second chance," Otte says. "If they're not pretty on the outside, like mine was, then they get another chance to show what's on the inside." In the state group division, the team from Kansas won overall. Team members were Luke Sankey and Wyatt Schumann. In second place was the Missouri 1 team, consisting of Samuel Laughlin, Rich Hill; Elizabeth Otte; and Chase Monte, Mexico.
