One competition in particular, the Career Development Contest at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), prepares youth for realworld professional challenges.

Prior to the NJAS, hosted this year in Louisville, Ky., contestants submitted a résumé for evaluation. At the show, the contestants participated in a private interview with three judges.

In the senior division, contestants create a résumé and interview for a potential career in an area of their choice. The second age division was added to the contest this year, allowing juniors in the intermediate division to submit a résumé and interview for a potential scholarship.

First-time contestant Ashlyn Richardson, Lincoln, Mo., says she enjoyed the challenge and appreciated the chance to sharpen her skills.
