

Junior Members Ring in the Gold

Nineteen of NJAA elite qualify.

N ineteen members of the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) brought their junior careers to the ultimate culmination when they were presented with the Gold Award at the 2011 National Junior Angus Show in Harrisburg, Pa.

The Gold Award is the third and highest level of recognition in the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP), created by the 1980-1981 NJAA Board of Directors and the Junior Activities Department of the American Angus Association.

To qualify for the award, junior members must first be awarded Bronze and Silver awards, which require an accumulation of 2,000 points or more earned throughout a member's junior career. Gold Awards are bestowed in the final year of junior eligibility and require an additional 1,000 points for a final total of 3,000 or more points.

Points are awarded based on junior activities ranging from Association activities, competitive activities, performance-testing activities and producing and merchandising Angus cattle. Junior members who qualify for the award are presented with a specially designed pin cast in gold. The award is made possible through the generous donors and supporters of the Angus Foundation.

The following juniors were honored with the Gold Award in 2011.

Megan Ahearn

Megan, the daughter of Mark and Cindy Ahearn, Wills Point, Texas, has been actively involved in the Texas Junior Angus Association (TJAA) and NJAA since the age of 11. She served as TJAA president in 2010 and as Miss Texas Angus in 2008. Megan received the third-place American Angus Auxiliary girls' scholarship in 2008 and competed for the title of Miss American Angus the same year.

Megan has shown at state and national levels and represented the TJAA in the 2010 National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest. She has competed in quiz bowl, team sales, the NJAA/Angus Journal photography contest and the Auxiliarysponsored All-American Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) Cook-Off. She has also attended the Leaders Engaged in Angus
