Angus youth received more than \$213,000 in scholarships.

upporting the educational pursuits of young people in the Angus industry is one of the key endeavors of the Angus Foundation. At the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Des Moines, Iowa, 116 scholarships were given to undergraduate and graduate students totaling more than \$213,000 invested in future agriculture industry leaders.

"The Angus Foundation prides itself on making an incredible investment in the future of our industry — our youth through education," says Milford Jenkins, Angus Foundation president. "Of course, very generous donors from across the Angus industry are really what makes this investment possible."

A five-member committee evaluates the scholarship applications and considers National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) involvement, state association participation, leadership and other criteria. Since 1998, the Angus Foundation has awarded more than \$2.7 million in undergraduate and graduate scholarships.

The 2017 scholarship recipients were recognized on July 13 and 14 during the NJAS.

Joseph "Joel" Harrison Memorial Angus **Scholarship.** The family and many friends of the late Joseph "Joel" Harrison have created the Joseph "Joel" Harrison Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund. Mr. Harrison



loved ranching and Angus cattle and was a member of the American Angus Association and the Kansas Angus Association. The first Joel Harrison Memorial Angus Scholarship of \$1,000 was awarded to the exhibitor of the grand champion bred-and-owned cow-calf pair at the 2017 NJAS this July in Des Moines, Iowa.

Receiving the 2017 Joseph "Joel" Harrison Memorial Angus Scholarship was Sydney Schnoor, Chowchilla, Calif.

Joe Bill Meng Scholarship. The late Joe William (Joe Bill) Meng Jr. enjoyed a lifetime of happiness as a devoted Angus breeder. He worked and lived on the Meng family farm in Woodburn, Ky., for many years and built their Angus herd into a nationally respected seedstock producer.

He was known throughout the purebred cattle industry as an expert in Angus pedigrees and cow families and was a respected judge, consultant and breeder. Meng served on the boards of both the Kentucky and American Angus Association, and was an inductee in the Angus Heritage Foundation. He managed the American Angus Futurity for many years and promoted the breed with fervor.

To honor Meng's legacy, many friends and

fellow Angus breeders sponsored the Joe Bill Meng Scholarship Benefit Auction via Angus Live April 4, 2017. Receiving the Joe Bill Meng Memorial Angus Scholarship of \$1,000 was Caroline Cowles, Rockfield, Ky.

Pat Goggins Memorial Angus Scholarship. The family of Pat Goggins has provided a \$11,750 gift, creating the Pat Goggins Memorial Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund.

Goggins was a publisher, columnist, auctioneer, livestock market owner, realestate broker and longtime Angus breeder from Billings, Mont. He gained great prestige in the Angus industry working as a fieldman and ringman for Western Livestock Journal, the Montana Farmer Stockman and Western Livestock Reporter.


A self-taught auctioneer, Goggins became one of the leading purebred livestock auctioneers in the United States. Over the years, Goggins' keen business sense led him to acquire three auction markets, numerous ranches and feedlots, the first livestock video auction, a real estate company and other business ventures.

"Pat spent a lifetime working in the livestock industry," says Babe Goggins, his wife. "We started the Vermilion Ranch more than 50 years ago with registered Angus cattle, and our six children, 16 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren have all been involved in the Angus industry."

Named scholarships

DeEtta Wood Memorial Scholarship.

A new scholarship was announced for 2016 in memory of DeEtta (Jones) Wood. DeEtta and her family have enjoyed raising purebred Angus cattle at their Wood Angus Farm in Willow Spring, N.C.

DeEtta was more than an Angus breeder, she was also a leader, serving the North Carolina Angus Auxiliary and as an advisor for the North Carolina Junior Angus Association.

Her legacy will be carried on in perpetuity in the Angus breed through the DeEtta Wood Memorial Scholarship and Achievement/ Leadership Awards Endowment Fund. The endowment will fund a \$1,000 scholarship given annually with preference to North Carolina Angus youth.

This year's winner is LeAnn Harward, Richfield, N.C.

Joseph and Susanne Bush/J&S Ranch Scholarship. Joe and Susanne Bush of J&S Ranch, Gatesville, Texas, began ranching in 2005 and started their Angus herd three years later. The Bushes are U.S. Army veterans with more than 40 years combined military service. They became involved in the Texas Angus Association, the Southwestern Cattle

Raisers Association and the American Angus Association. Their passion for the Angus industry fueled their decision to name the Angus Foundation as the primary charitable beneficiary for the bulk of their estate. A \$10,000 cash gift in 2015 was announced, creating the Joseph and Susanne Bush, J&S Ranch Scholarship and Junior Activity Endowment Fund. Each year a different Angus youth from Texas or Mississippi will receive a \$500 scholarship.

The winner of the Joseph and Susanne Bush, J&S Ranch Scholarship is Gabrielle Simpson, Tupelo, Miss.

The Cory Watt Memorial Scholarship was established following the Feb. 19, 2015, passing of Cory Watt, 22, of Iva, S.C., after a prolonged battle with cancer. A lifelong Angus breeder, Watt was halfway through his term as chairman of the National Junior Angus Board (NJAB). He was a faithful steward of Angus cattle and a positive role model for Angus youth nationwide.

Led by Kevin and Lydia Yon and their family with the donation of an Angus female, other family, friends and industry role models have raised a memorial of more than \$37,000 in Cory's memory to fund a scholarship to help juniors pursue higher education. While

he is no longer with us, Cory will remain an inspiration, and his memory will be honored in the NJAA and the American Angus Association for generations to come.

The 2017 recipient of the \$1,500 Cory Watt Memorial Scholarship was Alexis Cash, York, Pa.


Gordon and Robin Keys of Middleburg, Va., donated \$52,000 to the Angus Foundation for the creation of two scholarship endowment funds in 2015. Officially titled the Gordon and Robin Keys and Family Angus Scholarships, the generous donation will provide opportunities to Angus youth from Virginia and Maryland. Two \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded annually.

"It has been our intention to recognize the Angus Foundation, and we wanted to demonstrate our support in a very personal way," Gordon Keys says. "It seemed right to establish academic scholarships to help more youth achieve an education."

Gordon also says the decision to establish these two scholarships was because of the family's roots — Gordon is originally from Maryland, and Robin is from Virginia. For the past 20 years, their home has been Beaver Dam Farm, a 150-acre historic property in Virginia.

admiration of C.L. and Joyce Cook of Bricton Farms, Social Circle, Ga., and the impact C.L. had on their lives raising Angus cattle, Stacey and Melanie Britt and other longtime friends of the Cooks initiated a fundraising drive. C.L. and Joyce were overjoyed at the Georgia Genetics Angus Sale in April 2015 when more than \$37,000 was raised in C.L.'s honor from the proceeds of an Angus female donated by Britt Angus Farms and contributions from other generous Angus breeders.

Applicants from Georgia will be given first preference for the resulting undergraduate scholarship, which has no restrictions to academic major or student year classification.

The Ed and Wilma Minix/Black Witch Farm Angus Youth Scholarship was

established in 2014 when Wilma Minix, Black Witch Farm, Athens, Ga., donated \$102,500 to establish a scholarship and named the Angus Foundation a charitable beneficiary.

This scholarship is in honor of her late husband, Ed Minix, and herself. The fund will generate an annual \$2,500 scholarship and was awarded for the first time at the 2014 NJAS. The balance of the annual investment earnings will be used for youth activities, such as the Raising the Bar and LEAD conferences.

Established in 2014 with contributions in memory of the late Stan Prox, the **Stan Prox Memorial LEAD Award** covers the registration cost for one NJAA member attending the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conference. The recipient will be selected by random drawing from Illinois youth who have registered for the LEAD conference by the early registration deadline. Eligibility follows LEAD conference rules. Past recipients will be ineligible in the following years.

Angus Foundation Richard L. Spader Scholarships. Richard L. "Dick" Spader was responsible for starting the Angus Foundation during his tenure as executive vice president of the American Angus Association. Youth Educational Learning Program Endowment Fund with outright cash gifts through the Angus Legacy Society to give \$5,000 undergraduate scholarships in 2010 to 10 Angus youth who satisfied the first preference for field of study in animal science and range management, had a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA, with preveterinary medicine students specializing in bovine (large) animal practice also given strong preference, and with the \$5,000 scholarships renewable up to four years contingent on the recipient's continuing to meet the requirements.

Funded during the Vision of Value: Campaign for Angus, a capital campaign for the Angus breed that concluded in 2011, the Howard and JoAnne Hillman/Bon-View Farms Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund initially will allow for one \$1,000 scholarship annually, with preference given to a South Dakota Angus junior.

Howard and JoAnne Hillman of Sioux Falls, S.D., are no strangers to the Angus breed. From 1908-1999, their Angus seedstock operation, Bon-View Farms of Canova, S.D., produced quality, elite cattle through financial prosperity and hard economic times. They had many successful appearances in national showrings through the years and offered genetic advancements to the Angus breed through annual production sales.

Even after their dispersal sale in 1999, Howard and JoAnne have continued to support Angus cattle through volunteering their time in the American Angus Association and Angus Foundation. Howard served as chairperson of the Leadership Cabinet for the Vision of Value: Campaign for Angus.

Receiving the 2017 Bon-View Farms scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 was Brianna Erdmann, Leola, S.D.

Gary Brost LEAD Award. In honor of his accomplishments in the Angus breed, friends and family of the late Gary Brost of Harrodsburg, Ind., have created the Gary Brost LEAD Award Endowment Fund. Brost, an Angus breeder for many years, was a pioneer in the Angus business. In addition to raising two national champion Angus bulls, he was named a Master Breeder at the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity.

This fund will annually award two (or more) NJAA members with resources necessary to defray registration costs to attend the LEAD conference. Preference will be given to applicants with a farm/ ranch background from the states of Indiana and Illinois. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application will be used to select recipients, who remain eligible to receive other scholarships from the Angus Foundation or local, state, regional and national Angusrelated entities.

Oliver A. Hansen/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship. The legacy of Oliver A. Hansen will continue through a \$10,000 scholarship endowment that will provide one college-bound Angus junior member from Iowa a scholarship each year.

Hansen was an active member of the American Angus Association. He grew up in Dixon, Iowa, and assisted his father with the Angus herd at Laudmere Farm, which was established in 1931. He held several leadership roles in the Eastern Iowa Angus Association and was a strong advocate for Angus cattle and the ag industry. In 2009, he was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation. Oliver's sons, Ron Hansen of Durant, Iowa, and Tom Hansen of Enoch, Utah, chose to honor their father and family by creating the scholarship endowment in the name of their father and the farm.

The recipient of the Oliver A. Hansen Family/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship must have at one time been an NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association. The recipient must also be a resident of Iowa and a member or past member of the Iowa Junior Angus Association for at least four consecutive years. Graduating high school seniors or students currently enrolled in college are eligible. The scholarship must be applied to undergraduate studies and is applicable to any field of study.

The recipient of the \$500 Oliver A. Hansen/Laudmere Angus Farm Scholarship for 2017 was Katelyn Holmes, Benton, Iowa.


James E. Horton Jr. Angus Scholarship. Gregg and Lile Blythe established the James E. Horton Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund to honor Gregg's longtime friend, mentor and Angus partner, James Edwin Horton Jr. The fund was started with a gift of \$20,000 in 2006. Today it is funded at more than \$30,000 as Alabama Angus breeders and other family members have continued to contribute to the fund in tribute to "Mr. Ed." as he was fondly known.

A leader in the Angus breed for many years, Horton served as a director and president of the American Angus Association during the 1970s. He was instrumental in the acquisition of the *Angus Journal* and establishing CAB, and he led the efforts for the eventual creation of the Angus Foundation.

The \$1,500 James E. Horton Jr. Angus Scholarship was awarded to Savannah Schafer, Nehawka, Neb.

Jean Ann (Neumeyer) Bojorquez Memorial & Robert & Hollyce Neumeyer Angus Scholarship. In October 2007, Bob and Hollyce Neumeyer of Jaynbee Ranch, Bonners Ferry, Idaho, established the Jean Ann (Neumeyer) Bojorquez Memorial & Robert & Hollyce Neumeyer Angus Scholarship, in memory of their daughter, with a \$10,000 gift to the Angus Foundation. Jean Ann was very active in the Angus breed, showing Angus cattle and competing in junior activities at local, state, regional and national levels. As a young adult, she continued her involvement in the Angus breed, owning cows with her parents at the ranch.

Mack C. Olson Memorial Angus Scholarship. More than \$17,000 was raised in a fund drive led by friends in the Angus breed across the country to ensure the late Mack C. Olson's legacy would be carried on in perpetuity after a fatal automobile accident in December 2007.

Mack was a member of the American Angus Association, the Montana Angus Association, the Western Montana Angus Association and a director for the Western Montana Stockgrowers Association. The Olson family raises cattle in the Mission Valley area at Saint Ignatius, Mont.

The Mack C. Olson Memorial Angus Scholarship of \$500 went to C.J. Stevenson, Hobson, Mont.

NJAA Alumni and Friends Scholarship. Developed by the 2009-2010 National Junior Angus Board (NJAB), the objective of the NJAA Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund is to create more scholarship opportunities for deserving Angus youth of the NJAA and to inspire other juniors and alumni to give back to the NJAA.

Bob and Margaret Duprey of Cherry Knoll Farm, West Grove, Pa., have pledged a total of \$25,000 in matching funds to support the NJAA Board Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund. A different recipient will receive the scholarship each year. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application is used to select the scholarship recipient.

The NJAA Alumni and Friends Scholarship of \$1,500 went to Michaela Clowser, Milford, Neb.

Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship. The late Roscoe L. Richardson of Dracut, Mass., was a longtime member and officer of the New England Angus Association. He loved Angus cattle and the associations he developed from being an active Angus breeder. He always found time to support Angus activities in New England and to help other breeders.

Funded at his death in 1988 with inmemory contributions to the Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation in Great Barrington, Mass., the Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund of \$10,000 was later established with the Angus Foundation in early 2007. Created to continue his ideals of helping young people remain connected to agriculture, the primary selection criteria for this scholarship is to support Angus youth from New England states.

The \$500 Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Jayne Bannister, Kent, N.Y.

John Rucker Family Angus Scholarship. Hill Crest Farm at Delaplane, Va., was started in 1924 by John Rucker's father, Bayard Ambrose Rucker, and produced quality Angus cattle for more than 70 years. John and his wife, Marjorie, and their three daughters, Connie, Sue and Penny, were also involved in positions of leadership and service to the Angus breed.

In honor of the Rucker family's stewardship and involvement, Dwight and Carolyn Huff of Holly Hill Farm, Mount Sidney, Va., decided to create the John Rucker Family Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund with a \$10,500 gift to the Angus Foundation to provide educational scholarships to deserving youth of the Virginia Junior Angus Association.

Catie Hope, Berryville, Va., received the 2017 John Rucker Family Angus Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.

Ray Sims Angus Scholarship. In 2010, Ray Sims became the first auctioneer in more than 50 years to receive the prestigious Saddle & Sirloin Club's Portrait Award.

Sims, formerly of Raymore, Mo., helped develop purebred auctions into fast-paced and steady marketing venues. During his 46-year career, Sims traveled throughout the United States, selling for both large- and small-scale livestock breeders, including U.S. senators and three U.S. presidents — at more than an estimated 7,000 auctions with the majority of these being registered-Angus cattle sales.

Gary M. Stoller Jump Start Your **LEADership Award.** Established with contributions from the Stoller family and friends to the Angus Foundation in memory of the late Gary M. Stoller in 2012, this \$500 cash award is given to first- or second-year attendees to the LEAD Conference to cover registration fees and travel. Preference will be given to applicants from the western states of Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Selection of the award recipient will be made by the Angus Foundation Scholarship Selection Committee. Interested applicants must have submitted a one-page typed essay that includes the following information: Why attending LEAD conference is important to me, what I hope to gain by attending LEAD, and explanation of financial need.

Rachel Smith, Osceola, Neb., received the 2017 Gary M. Stoller Jump Start Your LEADership Award.

Vance Uden Memorial Angus Scholarship. Vance Uden purchased his first Angus heifer at age 12. From then on through his teenage years, he faithfully waited by the mailbox for his Angus Journal. Vance; his wife, Connie; and their two sons, Ty and Dru, built the widely respected TC Ranch, producing numerous well-known Angus sires.

An animal science graduate of the University of Nebraska, Vance was also a respected cattle judge for many breeds and had judged all the major shows. He was a strong supporter of youth and guided many to their start in the Angus business.

Continuing students majoring in animal science or agribusiness with plans to return to production agriculture are given first preference for this scholarship.

The \$1,000 Vance Uden Memorial Angus Scholarship for 2017 went to Jera Pipkin, Republic, Mo.

Woodlawn Farms Angus Scholarship. In 2005, Blanford and Joan Pierce of Creston, Ill., donated \$25,000 to establish the Woodlawn Farms Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund through the Angus Foundation. Angus cattle resided at Woodlawn Farms for 125 years, from 1881-2005. The Pierce family's legacy is carried on through this scholarship. Blanford served on the Vision of Value: Campaign for Angus board and has been invaluable in helping the Angus Foundation raise money for the campaign.

The Woodlawn Farms Angus Scholarship, in the amount of \$1,250, was awarded to Jordan Barker, Monticello, Iowa.

"In a League of Their Own" Angus **Foundation Scholarships.** The Angus Foundation awarded scholarships made possible by 2012 NJAS host states Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee. Excess funds raised for the 2012 NJAS in Louisville, Ky., themed "In a League of Their Own," allowed funding of a \$15,000 scholarship endowment to benefit Angus youth from those three states. Funds were initially to be used to support three undergraduate scholarships at \$500 each for a total expenditure of \$1,500 annually.

The announcement of this scholarship fund was made during the 2013 National

Western Stock Show in Denver, Colo., where the 2012 NJAS host states presented \$115,000 to the Angus Foundation. In addition to making \$15,000 available for youth scholarships, the donation allowed for \$5,000 to help support the 2013 NJAS; \$5,000 for the Angus Foundation's use for education, youth and research; and the balance of \$90,000 for a future NJAS involving Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee.

James and Mary Lou Henderson/ Bradley 3 Ranch Angus Scholarship. James and Mary Lou (Bradley) Henderson, with Mary's mother, Minnie Lou Bradley, own and operate Bradley 3 Ranch at Memphis, Texas. One of only a few herds that have maintained more than 200 registered Angus cows for more than 50 years, Bradley 3 Ranch today has more than 400 Angus cows. 

Kansas youth to attend the national LEAD Conference.



Angus Youth Scholarship (MAYS) was based upon the two organizations' shared goal to award a scholarship to a student continuing at least his or her second year of higher education.

The recipient of the scholarship must have at one time been an NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association. The recipient must also be a resident of Montana and a member or past member of the Montana Junior Angus Association.

The recipient must be pursuing at least his or her second year of higher education, as no graduating high school seniors will be considered. The scholarship must be applied to undergraduate studies and is applicable to any field of study. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application will be used to select the MAYS recipient. Recipients may also receive other scholarships from the Angus Foundation or local, state, regional and national Angusrelated entities.

Receiving the MAYS for 2016 in the amount of \$1,500 was Jordyn Wagner, Billings, Mont.

Pennsylvania Angus Youth Scholarship. The Pennsylvania Angus Youth Scholarship was initiated and supported by the

Pennsylvania Angus Association and Angus breeders from that state.

Fundraising efforts are under way to build this scholarship endowment toward its goal of \$25,000. Along with other Pennsylvania cattlemen, Bob Hay, manager of ErReR Hill Farms, Friedens, Pa., has helped lead the scholarship fundraising efforts.
