GOING FOR GOLD

Twenty-six National Junior Angus Association members receive Gold Awards.

eceiving a Gold Award from the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) is the most prestigious honor a junior member can achieve. The effort and dedication of these members has not gone unnoticed. They have put in countless hours of hard work in order to achieve their goals while advocating for the Angus breed. Gold Award winners were recognized for their achievement at this year's National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Des Moines, Iowa.

To qualify for a Gold Award, members must be previous winners of the Bronze and Silver awards, which can be achieved by earning a total of 1,000 points per award. To be recognized for a Gold Award, a member must have accumulated at least 3,000 total points. Points can be earned by participating in junior activities, performance testing, producing and merchandising Angus genetics, and other activities within the Association.

More than 40 years ago, the National Junior Recognition Program was created to accentuate and showcase what the best members of the NJAA had to offer. Gold Awards, along with Bronze and Silver awards, are perfect ways to recognize the continuous success and ambition NJAA members exhibit.

Laramie Chaffin

Laramie Chaffin is a lifelong member of the NJAA and a fourth-generation Angus

Chaffin has been an active member of 4-H and FFA, participating in various activities within the two associations. She won her county 4-H Beef Award and competed at the national level in the 4-H Livestock Skillathon Contest. During her time as an FFA member, she was the Illinois Section 13 sentinel, was awarded North Greene star greenhand, and was on the Section 13 FFA livestock judging

Chaffin has learned many lessons as a NJAA member. She says, "It was in those barns with the hum of the fans and blowers in my ear that I was able to open myself up to a connection with not only nature and the Angus breed, but the virtues that push NJAA members into a league of our own."
