A Gold Standard

Twenty-six National Junior Angus Association members receive Gold Award.

o some it may just be a pin plated in gold, but to the 26 junior Angus members earning this award, it is the symbol of the summit of their junior Angus careers. The pin represents their hard work, late nights and lessons learned while showing the business breed.

Gold is a highly malleable metal, ductile and resistant to corrosion. Similar to the metal gold, the juniors recognized at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Tulsa, Okla., for earning their Gold Award have been molded by this organization. They have been stretched and strained, but also shaped into excellent leaders, breeders and showmen. These individuals have reached the pinnacle of their junior Angus careers and are being honored in their final year of eligibility.

To qualify for the Gold Award, members must first earn the Bronze and Silver awards within the National Junior Recognition Program

(NJRP) by earning a total of 1,000 points per each award. Being recognized with the Gold Award means members have amassed a minimum of 3,000 points, earned by participating in junior activities, performance testing, production and merchandising of Angus genetics, and other relevant association or beef industry activities.

The NJRP was established more than 40 years ago to provide juniors the opportunity to be nationally recognized for their continued success. The bronze, silver and gold award system allows members to be acknowledged for their achievements and encourages them to strive for excellence.

The 26 Gold Award winners were presented with a special pin cast in gold and will receive local, regional and national recognition for their efforts.

Michael Cropp

A fifth-generation farmer, Michael Cropp has been a member of the NJAA since he was 4 years old. From Damascus, Md., he

dedicated many of his years in the NJAA to serving as a leader. Highly involved in the Maryland Junior Angus Association, Cropp served in several officer positions, including reporter, junior liaison and vice

president for two years. He also represented his state association as a voting delegate three times and attended Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) twice.

In 2014, he expanded his leadership service, as he was elected to serve as a director on the National Junior Angus Board (NJAB), and this year he was elected to serve the board as communications director.

At NJAS Cropp competed in team sales, quiz bowl, creative writing, livestock judging and the poster contest. He also competed in the NJAS carcass contest, placing first in 2011.

"As I look back on my junior Angus experience, I am filled with gratitude for my parents, countless mentors and the American Angus Association who have provided tremendous opportunities for my personal development and success," says Cropp.

He is currently working to improve his herd by applying science and technology through genomic profiles and genetic selection using artificial insemination (AI) and embryo transfer.

Cropp is entering his junior year at Kansas State University (K-State)—Manhattan where he is a member of the meats judging team. He is pursuing a degree in animal sciences with a minor in food science. Upon graduation he plans to do graduate studies in food science and hopes to work in the food industry in meat product research and development. He is the son of Craig and Michele Cropp.

Robert Dolson

A Lone Star State native, Robert Dolson from Hico, Texas, has been involved with Angus cattle since 2004. The son of Ken and

He grasped many of the opportunities being a junior

member provides as he represented his state three times as a voting delegate and attended LEAD in 2013 and 2014.

At the NJAS Dolson competed in team sales, placing first in 2012 and again in 2013. He also participated in the NJAS mentoring program in 2013. Dolson is an avid showman and has exhibited bred-and-owned (B&O) Angus cattle at several state and national shows.

A small-scale breeder, Dolson has placed an emphasis on the maternal side of his herd, using AI to produce rapid genetic improvements. Dolson was the recipient of the Undergraduate Angus Foundation Scholarship and the Texas Angus Association "Texas Challenge" Scholarship.

Dolson plans to graduate from Tarleton State University, Stephenville, Texas, in December 2016 with a degree in agricultural industries. He hopes his future career will include being a part of the beef industry and that he will remain involved in the world of Angus.

Currently serving as leadership director

on the NJAB, Grimes is a passionate and successful showman. She owned and led the grand champion heifer at the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) twice and earned reserve grand champion B&O heifer at the NJAS on two separate occasions.
