or Angus juniors, a scholarship is much more than a signed check. Scholarships mean that someone believes in their future and is willing to contribute to their goals. Thanks to generous donors, the Angus Foundation awarded more than \$200,000 in scholarships July 20 during the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Louisville, Ky.

True to its mission to support Angus youth, education and research, the Angus Foundation provides scholarships to graduate and undergraduate National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members. At the heart of the scholarship program is a desire to support the youth who will become future supporters and advocates for the breed.

"Angus breeders see youth as the future of the industry," says Katie Allen, Angus Foundation director of public relations and marketing. "They will be the ones to carry the breed forward, whether they are pursuing a degree in agriculture or not. These scholarships enable Angus youth to go on and do great things."

A five-member committee evaluates the scholarship applications and considers NJAA involvement, state association participation, leadership and other criteria. Since 1998, the Angus Foundation has awarded more than \$1.5 million in graduate and undergraduate scholarships to Angus youth.

New scholarships established in 2011-2012

Arkansas Angus Auxiliary Scholarship.

The Arkansas Angus Auxiliary's ambition to create more scholarship opportunities for Angus youth from Arkansas led to its donation of \$10,000 to the Angus Foundation to establish the Arkansas Angus Auxiliary Scholarship Endowment Fund. To be considered for this scholarship, applicants must be entering their sophomore, junior or senior year in college and be a current or past member of the Arkansas Junior Angus Association. Angus youth from Arkansas wishing to apply for this scholarship must complete the Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application. The Angus Foundation Scholarship Selection Committee chooses the scholarship winners.

Winner of the \$500 Arkansas Angus Auxiliary Scholarship for 2012 was Jacy Alsup, Gravette, Ark.

Oliver A. Hansen/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship. Thanks to members of the Hansen family and their Laudmere Farm of Durant, Iowa, the legacy of Oliver A. Hansen will continue through a \$10,000 scholarship endowment that will each year provide one college or college-bound Angus junior member from Iowa a scholarship.

Hansen was an active member of the American Angus Association and a friend of the Angus breed. He grew up in Dixon, Iowa, and assisted his father with the Angus herd at Laudmere Farm, which was established in 1931. He held several leadership roles in the Eastern Iowa Angus Association and was a strong advocate for Angus cattle and the agricultural industry. In 2009, he was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation. Oliver's sons, Ron Hansen of Durant, Iowa, and Tom Hansen of Enoch, Utah, chose to honor their father and family by creating the scholarship endowment in the name of their father and the farm.

The recipient of the Oliver A. Hansen Family/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship must have at one time been an NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association. The recipient must also be a resident of Iowa and a member or past member of the Iowa Junior Angus Association for at least four consecutive years. Graduating high school seniors or students currently enrolled in college are eligible. The scholarship must be applied to undergraduate studies and is applicable to any field of study.

Montana Angus Youth Scholarship. In

December 2011, the Montana Angus Association and Montana Angus Auxiliary decided to create a \$25,000 scholarship endowment within the Angus Foundation, naming it the Montana Angus Youth Scholarship (MAYS). MAYS will replace the continuing-education scholarship that the Montana Angus Association and Montana Angus Auxiliary awarded for the first and final time in fall 2011.

Montana's two Angus organizations' shared goal with this fund was to award one \$1,000 scholarship to a student continuing at least his or her second year of higher education. The organizations founding the scholarship believed that it would create more opportunities for Montana youth to receive scholarships than they could offer within the state, as MAYS allows students to fill out one application and be considered for every scholarship the Angus Foundation administers.

The recipient of the scholarship must have at one time been an NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association. The recipient must also be a resident of Montana and a member or past member of the Montana Junior Angus Association. The recipient must be pursuing at least his or her second year of higher education, so no graduating high school seniors will be

considered. This reasoning is based on not wanting to conflict with the existing scholarship that the Montana Angus Auxiliary currently awards to a graduating girl and boy. The scholarship must be applied to undergraduate studies and is applicable to any field of study.

Receiving the first MAYS in the amount of \$1,000 was Cortney Bromenshenk, Billings, Mont.

Continuing Scholarships Angus/Talon Scholarships

Camron "Cam" Cooper, owner of the Talon Ranch located in Twin Bridges, Mont., is a woman who loves the land and Angus cattle. She believes in educating our children, who are the future of the beef industry. At the Angus Foundation's Supporter Recognition Event in Louisville, Ky., in 2009, Cooper announced via video and formal letter that she had made a significant bequest gift by naming the Angus Foundation as a charitable beneficiary of her estate. Cooper established the Angus/Talon Youth Educational Learning Program Endowment Fund with outright cash gifts to give \$5,000 undergraduate scholarships in 2010 to 10 Angus youth who satisfied the first preference for field of study in animal science and range management, had a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA, with preveterinary medicine students specializing in bovine (large) animal practice also given strong preference, and with the \$5,000 scholarships renewable up to four years

contingent on the recipient's continuing to meet the requirements.

A leader in the Angus breed for many years, Horton served as a director and president of the American Angus Association during the 1970s. He was instrumental in the acquisition of the *Angus Journal* and establishing CAB, and he led the efforts for the eventual creation of the Angus Foundation.

Developed by the 2009-2010 NJAA Board of Directors, the objective of the NJAA Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund is to create more scholarship opportunities for deserving Angus youth of the NJAA and to inspire other juniors and alumni to give back to the NJAA. Bob and Margaret Duprey of Cherry Knoll Farm, West Grove, Pa., have pledged a total of \$25,000 in matching funds to support the NJAA Board Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund. A different recipient will receive the scholarship each year. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application is used to select the scholarship recipient.

Ray Sims Angus Scholarship

In 2010, Ray Sims became the first

auctioneer in more than 50 years to receive the prestigious Saddle and Sirloin Club's Portrait Award.

Sims, who now resides in Raymore, Mo., helped develop purebred auctions into fast-paced and steady marketing venues. During his 46-year career, Sims traveled throughout the United States, selling for both large- and small-scale livestock breeders, including U.S. senators and three U.S. presidents — more than an estimated 7,000 auctions with the majority of these being registered Angus cattle sales.

Once expenses were satisfied for the portrait painting of Sims now on display in the Saddle and Sirloin Portrait Collection in Louisville, Ky., the Ray Sims Portrait Committee generously donated the remaining funds of more than \$20,000 to the Angus Foundation to establish the Ray Sims Scholarship Endowment Fund for Angus youth scholarships.

The \$1,000 Ray Sims Angus Scholarship was awarded to Paige Wallace, Stotts City, Mo.

A Rising Star

The full-ride, Rising Angus Star Youth Scholarship, a four-year, full-tuition scholarship renewable each year upon the recipient's continuing to meet the requirements, was funded by Angus breeders who wanted to provide a scholarship to eligible applicants based on financial need, personal and/or family hardship, physical handicap, medical disability, or other extenuating circumstances or combination of circumstances that would warrant special consideration by the Angus Foundation Scholarship Selection Committee.

David and Mary Ann McMahon of Belle Point Ranch, Lavaca, Ark., and other generous Angus breeders spearheaded this fundraising effort. Named the recipient of this scholarship in 2009, 2010 and 2011, Clinton Laflin, Olsburg, Kan., continued to meet the requirements and was named the 2012 recipient of the Rising Angus Star Youth Scholarship.

Roscoe L. Richardson

The late Roscoe L. Richardson of Dracut, Mass., was a longtime member and officer of the New England Angus Association. He loved Angus cattle and the associations he developed from being an active Angus breeder. He always found time to support Angus activities in New England and to help other breeders.
