**The LU Ranch,** Worland, Wyo., was recently announced by the Wyoming Stock Growers Association (WSGA) as one of the finalists for its 2012 Environmental Stewardship Award.

"Mike embodies the highest qualities of a landowner who truly cares for his land and who is working cooperatively with other ranchers, public agencies and conservation organizations to leave a lasting legacy of stewardship and commitment to the land he loves. The LU Ranch is truly a hallmark for a successful public lands ranching operation," the Washakie County Conservation District wrote in its nomination of Mike Healy and the LU Ranch.

As manager of his family's ranch, Healy has introduced numerous improvements to

the land, including prescribed burning, fence modification for wildlife, pasture and water developments, aspen enhancement, and grazing plans. Healy also helped implement a successful and ongoing project to replace invasive species with native vegetation, directly affecting more than 75 miles of streams.

Healy works extensively with public land agencies to improve range, roads, habitat, hunter access and fences to allow unhindered migration. Nearly 3,000 acres of the LU Ranch are also under conservation easement, conserving open spaces, wildlife habitat and ranching in perpetuity.

In addition to a commitment to their land and livestock, Healy and his late wife, Jean, have always been active in community activities and volunteer efforts in both agricultural and community organizations. The Healys are also recipients of numerous stewardship and producer awards.

**Robert "Bob" Perry,** Bethel, Mo., was named Northeast Missouri Livestock Person of the Year. Perry has been an active livestock producer and an advocate for quality livestock production in northeast Missouri his entire life.

"Selected by performance, evaluated by comparison" is the foundation motto at Perry Farms. The farm's roots include an Angus herd that traces back to a heifer purchased by his wife Kathleen's father in 1922 and the Duroc hogs Bob showed as an FFA member.

The Perrys maintain a closed herd, adding new bloodlines through artificial insemination (AI). They submit Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®) — including birth, weaning and yearling weights; and ultrasound measurements — to attain expected progeny differences (EPDs) for each trait. Their herd is selected to satisfy customers seeking calving-ease bulls with high weaning and yearling weights.

Bob served on the National Swine Improvement Federation (NSIF) as well as the Missouri Swine Improvement Federation (MSIF). The federations set up central test stations to measure parameters such as feed efficiency, rate of gain, loin-eye area, and backfat in order to provide comparisons between bloodlines. Bob served on the boards of the University of Missouri (MU) and Northeast Missouri (NEMO) swine test stations for many years.

Bob has shown a plethora of champions at swine type conferences, state fairs and national shows. In addition, the Perrys have sold purebred hogs throughout the United States and internationally, including Canada, Mexico, the Philippines, Japan and Korea.

In addition to welcoming 4-H, FFA and collegiate teams to their farm for livestock judging practices, the Perrys have provided

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hogs for intercollegiate and FFA livestock judging contests at the American Royal since the 1960s. And Bob has served as an official judge for the collegiate contest.
