## IN THE NEWS

**Jerz Angus Farms,** Decatur, Mich., has been recognized by the American Angus Association as a Historic Angus Herd.

The operation began in 1959, when Raymond Jerz and his wife bought two heifers from Herschel Smith. Smith also supplied breeding stock for the Jerz cow-calf operation to expand.

Raymond's son, Craig, has been involved with the farm since the 1980s and says: "The goal of the operation has always been to effectively utilize the grass grown on our sandy hills that are too dry to produce highyielding row crops."

Jerz Angus Farms continues to practice spring and fall calving, while finishing steers with family-produced feed. The herd currently consists of 51 registered Angus cattle, 28 calves and four steers. Craig and his son, Justin, manage the herd.

Times have changed since the farm began more than 50 years ago. Craig says the most noticeable difference in their operation today is the time it takes to finish a steer, which has diminished to 12-14 months rather than two years. More efficient practices and technology will ensure Jerz Angus Farm is successful for generations to come.

The Historic Angus Herd Award is presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

**Larry Earhart,** owner of Earhart Farms Inc., Powell, Wyo., has been honored by the Association with the Historic Angus Herd Award.

The operation began in 1959, when 15-year-old Earhart purchased three registered Angus heifers for a 4-H project.

The base of the herd was purchased from L.H. Crawford and Son, Red Lodge, Mont., and Rafter 33 Ranch, Big Horn, Wyo. Earhart continued to expand the herd and was up to 25 cows when he graduated from college. By taking advantage of new technology, Earhart was able to grow his operation to 150 registered Angus cows. In 1970, he began using artificial insemination (AI), and ultrasound technology in 1995.

Today, Earhart and his daughter, Andrea, continue to manage the 100-cow herd.

Earhart believes his operation is the "total package concept: production, performance, structure and carcass."

**Stan Prox,** Macomb, Ill., was inducted into the Land of Lincoln Purebred Livestock Breeder's Association Hall of Fame during the organization's annual meeting in Springfield, Ill., Dec. 9, 2011. With this honor, his portrait will hang in the Illinois Department of Agriculture building. Prox served as the beef director for the Land of Lincoln group from 1988 to 2006.

Prox got started in the Angus business when he was 8 years old. His family farmed near Carthage, and, while in high school, he served as president of FFA, 4-H and the county federation. After high school, Prox

attended Western Kentucky University and worked on an Angus ranch. After returning to Illinois, he went into partnership with Vega Farms.

In 1963, Vega Farms exhibited the champion Angus bull at the Illinois Angus Futurity. This bull sired the grand and reserve champion bulls at the futurity in 1965, and the grand champion female in 1966.

After Vega Farms dispersed in 1966, Prox formed Shilo Farms, near Macomb, together with his father and brothers-in-law, Wayne and George Sperry. Shilo Farms has exhibited cattle at shows for many years.

The family has shown many champions, including the champion heifer at the Illinois Angus Futurity in 1985.

Prox has been involved in many groups starting with his election to the Lamoine Valley Angus Association and Illinois Angus Association board of directors in 1966. He served as president of the Lamoine Valley group in 1969.

Prox was appointed to the Illinois State Fair Board in 1991, and he was chairman of the Illinois Beef Expo in 1993. In 1994, he was presented an award for being on the Illinois Angus Association board for 25 years. He has also been the chairman of the Illinois delegation to the American Angus Association Annual Convention of Delegates for many years.

In addition to livestock organizations, Prox has been involved with the McDonough County Power Co-op since 1987 and has been a member of the Association of Illinois Electrical Co-ops since 1995.

He has been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1966.

**Dave Seibert,** Washington, Ill., retired University of Illinois (U of I) Extension educator, was recently awarded the Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) Eagle Award for Excellence during the Illinois Agricultural Association's annual meeting in Chicago in December.

The IFB Eagle Award for Excellence recognizes an individual or organization for excellence on issues or programs important to the Farm Bureau and agriculture on a statewide and/or national basis.

Seibert began his career as an extension educator in 1968, serving as the assistant and associate extension advisor for McDonough County. He has served the U of I on several levels, including working as the area livestock advisor and animal systems educator. He also pioneered numerous programs for U of I Extension, including 4-H and FFA quality assurance and ethics clinics; Livestock E-Quiz; area cow-calf field days; Superior Young Producer awards; regional meats judging workshops; the Illinois swine environmental series; and many more. Throughout his career, Seibert has received many honors, including the U of I CAPE Award; the College of ACES Professional Staff Award for Sustained Excellence; the Extension Outstanding or Innovative Team Program Award and Sustained Award; the Illinois Commodity Conference Friend of Agriculture Award; the Illinois FFA Honorary State Degree; the G.R. Carlisle Award for Excellence in Extension Teaching; the Illinois Pork Producers Education Award; and an honorary membership from the U of I Hoof-N-Horn chapter.

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Dorothy (Porterfield) McHugh, 69,

Tignall, Ga., died Jan. 6 at her home. Dorothy was born July 29, 1942, in Fort Deposit, Ala., and had lived in the Tignall community for 12 years. She graduated from Auburn University and was a retired mathematics engineer in the aerospace and education industries.

She and her husband, Marion McHugh Jr., owned Rolling M Ranch. She was a longtime member of the Georgia Angus Association, and had been a member of the American Angus Association since 1998.

She was a member of the St. Joseph Catholic Church in Washington, Ga.

In addition to her husband, Dorothy is survived by sons Marion III and Patrick; daughters Connie and Lana; sisters Martha and Annie; and six grandchildren.

## **James Barton "Bart" Glass,** 74, Stanford, Ky., died Jan. 15.

Bart was born in Philadelphia, Pa., to James and Mary (Neely) Glass. He was reared having a close association with purebred Holstein cattle. Bart attended Central Bucks High School where he was active in FFA, serving as president and regional president. He obtained chapter and state farmer degrees and won chapter, regional and state livestock judging contests, as well as being runner-up in the state dairy judging contest.

Upon graduation he attended the National Agriculture College in Doylestown, Pa. Bart was president of the Block and Bridle Club for two years and class vice president for three years. He won three intercollegiate judging contests as a member of the livestock judging team. He also participated on the dairy and poultry judging teams.

Bart graduated in 1959 with a bachelor's degree in animal science. During his college summers, Bart worked for such noted Angus farms as Hideway, Mahrapo and Ankeny Farms. Upon graduation Bart and Jane were married and took over management of the Hasty Hills Angus herd in Suffern, N.Y., leading it to national recognition until its dispersal in 1965.

The Glasses then rented Hasty Hills Farm and Glynwood Farm and operated their own herd of Angus cattle, as well as an Angus sales management service until 1968. In 1968, Bart and George Perkins, a longtime Angus breeder, formed a partnership with locations in New York and Kentucky. During this period the Walbridge Farm herd bred, raised and showed 126 individuals at the International, Denver, Kansas City, Eastern National, Eastern States, Royal Winter Fair, Pennsylvania International, San Antonio and many state and regional shows. They exported cattle to eight foreign countries.

The Walbridge partnership was dispersed in the fall of 1980 for a record average of \$5,640 per head. Bart started to breed Chianina cattle in 1973 and owned and operated the Walco Chianina herd in Stanford until his death.

Bart was elected to Outstanding Young Men in America in 1969. He judged many national and international livestock shows of many species and breeds in his career. He was a respected livestock expert and consultant to many Standardbred breeders and both the Kentucky Standardbred and Lexington Selected Sales companies. He had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1965. He was a former president of the Mid-East Region of the American Chianina Association.

In addition to his wife, Bart is survived by sons John Daniel "Dan," James Jr. and

Barton; sister Betty Jane; and six grandchildren.

**Anabel Johnson,** 83, Ida Grove, Iowa, died Jan. 18 at her home.

Anabel was born Sept. 21, 1928, to Everett and Ruth (Hedstrom) Lindberg in rural Sac County, Iowa. She graduated from Odebolt High School in 1945, then received her teaching certificate and attended Buena Vista College in Storm Lake, Iowa. Anabel's family and faith are hallmarks of her life.
