in the 1950s, he learned about artificial insemination (AI) and came to believe the only way to make genetic improvements in beef cattle was through the use of technology and sound science.

Since 1964, Gardiner Angus Ranch has been a total AI and embryo transplant (ET) operation and has used expected progeny differences (EPDs) to make genetic selections since the inception of the technology. The operation has kept extensive records on reproductive performance, gain and carcass data since 1970.

Gardiner realized the producer must be rewarded for better genetics and that in a true value-based system, the cattle feeder and packer should also recognize the potential for better margins. Ultimately, however, the consumer could rely on the consistency, nutrition, safety and overall quality of a better beef product.

The original Gardiner ranch was homesteaded near Ashland, Kan., in 1885 by Henry Gardiner's grandfather. Today, it is a family-owned and -operated 48,000-acre beef operation that produces registered- and commercial-Angus cattle.

Gardiner has been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1950.

Joe Cassady has been selected as the new Animal Sciences Department head at South Dakota State University (SDSU), pending

the approval of the South Dakota Board of Regents. His appointment is effective June 22, 2013. Cassady also serves as executive director of the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF).

Cassady received his doctorate in

animal science in 1999 from the University of Nebraska–Lincoln (UNL), where he had previously received a master's degree in animal science. He earned a bachelor's degree in animal science from Iowa State University in 1993.

As head of the Department of Animal Science at SDSU, Cassady will provide effective management of the department and provide leadership to develop and maintain strong, relevant research, teaching and extension programs, stressing excellence across the programs.

He will provide leadership to establish goals and objectives for the department and build strong working relationships; recruit, evaluate and retain faculty, SDSU Extension field specialists, staff and students; develop and manage budgets; coordinate department

fundraising efforts; oversee management of departmental facilities; represent the department in all official communications with the college and university; and foster and build strong relationships with other disciplines and stakeholders.

Prior to joining the faculty at SDSU, Cassady served as an associate professor in animal science at North Carolina State University (NCSU), was an assistant professor in animal science at NCSU and worked as a research associate in genetics and breeding for the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) with the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center (USMARC) in Nebraska.
