Dale Handlin, 79, Townville, S.C., died Dec. 22, 2008, at his home.

A native of Ellsworth County, Kan., he was the son of Frank and Hester (Lang) Handlin. He graduated from Kansas State University and received a master's degree from Texas A&M University. He was an associate professor in animal science at Clemson University for 37 years.

Dale especially enjoyed working with students and was the faculty advisor of the judging team and the Block and Bridle Club for many years. He was the director of the Swine Center and oversaw the moving of the center when Hartwell Lake was built.

A life member of the American Angus Association since 1979, Dale and his wife, Willa, owned and operated Willa Dale Angus Farm.

In addition to his wife, Dale is survived by son Dale Jr.; daughter Janet; brothers Ralph and Max; sisters Fae and Alice; and three grandchildren.

Burleigh Anderson, 76, Landisburg, Pa., died Dec. 24, 2008, in North Middleton Township, Cumberland County, Pa., following a one-vehicle accident.

He was born March 17, 1932, in Perth Amboy, N.J., to Jacob and Loretta (Pearsall) Anderson.

He graduated from Woodbridge High School, Rutgers University and the University of Pennsylvania Veterinarian School. He was an Army veteran. He was the retired 1958 founder of Tri-County Veterinary Service, Loysville, Pa., and a member of the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medical Association.

A life member of the American Angus Association since 1963, he and his wife, Joan, owned and operated Meadow Mist Farms in Landisburg. He will be remembered as a loving and faithful husband and father, as a tireless worker, and for his dedicated service to the local farm community and his pioneer work to promote performance-tested Angus cattle.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by son Timothy, daughters Elizabeth and Karen, and five grandchildren.

H.E. "Herb" Valentine, 91, Gainesville, Ga., died Jan. 6 at his home following an extended illness.

Herb was born and raised in Valentines, Va., a town founded by and named for his ancestors. He earned his undergraduate degree at Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Va. He earned his medical degree from the Medical College of Virginia before heading south to Emory University in Atlanta for his internship.

After a year at Emory, he went to Charleston, Va., for three months with the Navy and then to Camp Lejeune in North Carolina for medical officer training. Herb served overseas in World War II with the First Marine Division until the war ended. He served in three campaigns in the Pacific with the occupation troops in China.

Herb began his practice in Gainesville, Ga., in 1948. He was a member of the first medical staff of Hall County Hospital, the previous name of Northeast Georgia Medical Center. He served as the hospital's chief of staff and was president of the Hall County Medical Society.

Herb and his wife, Bonnelle, have been life members of the American Angus Association since 1973, owning Valentine Farms in Pendergrass, Ga. In addition to his wife, Herb is survived by sons Dick, Tommy and Mike.

Bill's education was interrupted by World War II, when he served in the Pacific Theater as a radar officer on a B-29 in the Army Air Corps for three and one-half years. He married Patricia Culbertson of Minneapolis, Minn., in 1945.

Bill was instrumental in the development of the master-planned community of Miami Lakes which opened in 1962. The community is now incorporated as the town of Miami Lakes and is home to 27,000 residents. He and his brother, Phil, were instrumental in the land acquisition that led to the development of Amelia Earhart Park, which now includes the Bill Graham Farm Village.

Bill fell in love with Angus cattle at the age of 16 when his father let him breed some native Florida cattle to Angus bulls. Following World War II, he established a registered Angus herd in Albany, Ga., and in the early 1950s began performance testing. A life member of the American Angus Association since 1963, Bill was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation in 1999.

Bill was president, chief operating officer (COO) and chairman of the board of the

Graham Co., which, in addition to Angus cattle, was involved in dairy farming, sugar cane production, pecan groves, timber and real estate development.

He was an active leader in local and state community and agricultural organizations for many years, including serving as president of the Dade County Cattlemen's Association, the Florida Dairy Association, the Independent Dairy Farmer's Association, and as a board member of Performance Registry International. He was inducted into the Florida Agriculture Hall of Fame Feb. 15, 2000.

Bill was also on the board of directors of the Hialeah Chamber of Commerce and


