Joseph "Joe" Reznicek, 67, Aliceville, Ala., died Jan. 15, 2010, at his home on Cow Creek Ranch after a valiant battle with lymphoma.

Joe was born June 26, 1942, in Moline, Ill., the son of August and Marie (Zimmerman) Reznicek. He was raised on a diversified farming and cattle operation in south-central Illinois. Joe received a bachelor's degree in animal husbandry from the University of Illinois–Champaign. He dedicated his career to the production of high-quality genetics in Angus and Brangus cattle.

Joe joined Cow Creek Ranch in 1985, became managing partner in 1994 and eventually became sole owner. Joe led Cow Creek Ranch to become a nationally recognized producer of seedstock. It is presently the country's 21st largest operation.

The Reznicek family purchased their first registered Angus female in the spring of 1952, and in 2002 the family celebrated its 50th year in the seedstock business. Joe had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1964 and served two terms on the American Angus Association Board of Directors. He was active in local and civic affairs and served as a judge of many state, national and international livestock shows.

Joe was a devoted husband, father and grandfather. He spent his last year preparing and mentoring his family to move the business forward.

Joe is survived by wife Joy; daughter Carrie; son Matthew; mother Marie; brothers Daniel, David and August; and four granddaughters.

Max McCuen, 58, Yale, Iowa, died Jan. 28 at Mercy Medical Center in Des Moines, Iowa. Max was born Nov. 13, 1951, in Perry, Iowa, to Robert and Beverly (Lorenzen) McCuen. He graduated from Perry Community High School in 1969.

Max started his farming career with dairy cattle. He later raised purebred and production hogs and registered Angus cattle. Max had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1967. He loved farming, big John Deere tractors, big dually trucks, and cars with big engines.

Max is survived by sister Barbara; niece Rebecca; close friend LaRoyce Kress; and many other friends and relatives.

Harley Ford, 89, Adrian, Mo., died Feb. 7 at the Cass Regional Medical Center in Harrisonville, Mo.

Harley was born Feb. 22, 1920, in Deepwater Mo. He attended school in Missouri. Harley was united in marriage to Kathryn Simonson Oct. 28, 1937, in Des Moines, Iowa.

Harley had a 25-year career in the Army. Serving in the Field Artillery, he served in World War II in Italy and North Africa, and in the Korean Conflict. During that time, he was also a professor of Military Service & Tactics at the University of Missouri– Columbia and Iowa State University (ISU).

He was in the Fifth Army and received many medals, including the Army Commendation Medal; the Good Conduct Medal (6 awards); European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal; the National Defense Service Medal; the Korean Service Medal; and the United Nations Service Medal.

Upon his retirement from the military in October 1960, Harley moved to Adrian and began his second career as an Angus farmer. During this time, Zodiac Angus Farm won numerous championships at the Bates County Fair, Missouri State Fair and American Royal.

In January 2004, Harley was presented the American Angus Association Historic Herd Award, an honor given to Angus herds that have continually produced registered Angus cattle by the same family for 50 years or more. At the time of his death he was managing an approximately 100-head herd.

Harley is survived by son James; daughter Sherri; numerous nieces and nephews; and his companion, Alice.
