### IN THE NEWS

The Ohio Angus Association has announced the recent hiring of **Dan Wells,** Chillicothe, Ohio, as its new executive secretary/fieldman. Wells brings with him an extensive background, knowledge, and



awareness of the Angus breed, its people and events, in Ohio and

beyond. Raised on a registered Angus farm outside Chillicothe, Wells grew up showing steers and Angus heifers at the

county fair and, occasionally, at the Ohio Angus Preview Show. Wells attended Ohio State University (OSU), where he earned a bachelor's degree in agriculture, studying animal science and ag business.

After college, Wells accepted the position of executive director of the Virginia Angus Association. During his time in Virginia, he oversaw the day-to-day operations of the association, planned their many events and activities, ran their sale management operation — Virginia Sales Services — and launched their graphic design and layout service, working directly with many Angus breeders and businesses in the Mid-Atlantic region.

In spring 2008, Wells returned to his family farm in Ohio after accepting an opportunity to work for Cotton & Associates. Today, Wells still resides on the family farm in Chillicothe, with wife Mallorey and 2-yearold son Garrett. He and his father, Ray, own and operate Wells Livestock and he also owns and operates Wells Livestock Services, offering complete livestock marketing services and equipment sales.

YCC allows young leaders the chance to see firsthand and further understand all aspects of the beef industry. Attendees participate in a nationwide tour of the beef production chain from ranch to feedlot to packing plant, through marketing and regulatory affairs, and finally ending at consumer foodservice. members, be between the ages of 25 and 50 and be an NCBA member.

Widdowson, and his wife, Laurie, own and operate SandPoint Cattle Co. LCC, located on 13,000 acres in the southern panhandle of Nebraska. The operation is home to about 3,200 registered Angus cattle, including 1,900 mother cows. The Widdowsons have been very active in supporting the Angus breed through the Angus Foundation.

According to the NCBA, the tour will begin in Denver with a comprehensive overview of the industry. Participants will take an in-depth look at many of the issues affecting the beef industry and what NCBA is doing to address these issues on behalf of its members, and they will receive a comprehensive view of market information from CattleFax. The group will then travel to JBS Five Rivers' Kuner Feedyard, then tour the JBS Greeley packing and processing plant. Participants will then travel to the Chicago Board of Trade and OSI Inc., one of the nation's premier beef patty manufacturers. The next stop will be the nation's capital, where participants will get a chance to meet with their respective congressmen and senators and many regulatory agencies that make decisions affecting agriculture.

Good. He was raised on an 80-acre livestock and crop farm in Van Wert County with three brothers and one sister.

Don's livestock interests manifested early, through 4-H and FFA projects with Oxford sheep and swine. He was a member of the swine ton litter club at age 13, showed a champion pen of five lambs at a district

show the next year, and was a member of Ohio's champion junior livestock judging team. Don is recognized nationally and internationally for his accomplishments as a teacher, livestock judge, administrator and strong supporter of research.

In 1939, Don entered Ohio State University (OSU), working in the beef and horse barns and the meats laboratory to work his way through school. He also played baseball and wrestled for OSU.

During his senior year, Don was called to active duty in World War II, serving in Europe and the Pacific. He earned the Combat Infantry Badge and two battle stars. Throughout the years, Don has been an advocate for veterans and the armed services.

After returning to OSU, he was on the 1946 OSU livestock judging team. He was high man in judging at the Kansas City Royal Livestock Show and was second high man at the Chicago International Livestock Exposition, where the team won.

Don received his bachelor's degree in 1947 and was named to the Animal Science Hall of Fame at OSU in 1950. In 1970, he received the OSU College of Agriculture Centennial Award. After a summer of working with the Pet Milk Co. in public relations, Don started his 40-year career at Kansas State University (K-State).

His first position was to coach the livestock judging team, manage the purebred beef herds, and teach/advise students. As judging team coach, he won 14 major contests in 18 years. At the end of his first semester at K-State, he returned to Ohio to marry Jane Swick and bring her back to live in Manhattan.

In 1950, Don received his master's degree from K-State and his doctorate from the University of Minnesota in 1957. He was named department head of Animal Husbandry at K-State in 1966 and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1987. Following a devastating tornado in 1966, he and others with his "can-do" attitude helped to form the Livestock and Meat Industry Council. This is a group of industry leaders that would aid in seeking private and corporate funding for use in improving or rebuilding facilities used to teach students and perform research.

Don's illustrious career is dotted with many recognitions and teaching/leadership awards, large and small. His portrait was hung with those of other great contributors of the livestock industry in the Hall of Fame portrait gallery at the Saddle and Sirloin Club in Louisville, Ky.

Don was widely known as a livestock judge and was a strong advocate for measurable carcass traits to back up meat animal judging decisions. His decision to select an Angus-
