have a family operation that has more than 4,000 acres of pasture and grass, 1,650 acres of nonirrigated and 1,955 acres of irrigated cropland. Wheat, grain sorghum, corn, soybeans, silage, alfalfa, cotton and Bermuda grass are all grown on their diversified operation, along with about 550 beef cows and 770 finished feeder cattle.

The Bortzs say that to be sustainable an operation has to be economical. They say this can be accomplished without mining the land. They have taken marginal farmland that was abused and returned it to be productive and environmentally friendly.

They have three children, Brandon, Amber and Darnell.

**Galen** and **Lori Fink**, Randolph, Kan., have a ranch that includes more than 900 acres of pasture and grass with 300 head of beef cows. They implant 1,000 to 1,200 embryos per year into cooperator herds, and sell around 600 bulls from an embryo calf production enterprise. They have one of the largest embryo transplant (ET) programs in the United States.

The Finks started the Fink Beef Genetics web site in 1998 and say e-commerce is an important part of communicating with customers and marketing seedstock.

Galen and Lori are both graduates of K-State, and have one daughter, Megan.

**Craig** and **Amy Good**, Olsburg, Kan., have a farm that includes more than 1,860 acres, most of it in pasture and grass. Their diversified operation includes beef cows and calves and a large swine finishing operation.

Currently, the Goods raise Duroc swine, marketed as a breed-specific, high-quality and no-antibiotic product. It is sold mostly to high-end restaurants and Internet sales with a label identifying it as "Good Farms Duroc pork." In addition, they have had a purebred Angus herd since 1964, and sell Angus bulls and heifers.

They consider a large part of their contribution to agriculture to be their purebred breeding stock businesses. Their goal was to produce high-quality, high-health animals that would improve the
