IN THE NEWS

Evenson Angus Farm of Hettinger, N.D., has been recognized by the American Angus Association with the Historic Angus Herd Award, presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

Will Evenson founded the family homestead in 1907 and became the first of what would be four generations on the ranch.

Will's son, Ernest, and his wife, Lillian, purchased the existing ranch in 1945 and began a dairy operation. In 1952, they purchased 12 registered Angus females from the famous Henry Henke herd of Hannover, N.D. This purchase patented the Ernest Evenson and Sons registered Angus herd. In 1972, Ernest and Lillian sold the ranch to their sons, Bill and Wally. Since then, the farm has expanded to approximately 11,000 acres, and, since 1980, has hosted 31 annual production sales. The Evensons have also consigned numerous top-performing and top-selling bulls to the annual North Dakota Angus Bull Sale. The herd sire, Rally New Frontier 523, was selected as the second-ranked bull of the 2006 Midland Bull Test Sale and went on to be a proven Pathfinder[®] Sire.

Throughout the ranch's development, the Evensons have used technology, including artificial insemination (AI), performance testing and ultrasound, to improve their herd. The family has collected carcass data on 55 head of homebred, raised and fed steers, which achieved 97% Choice or higher, 20% Prime and 46% *Certified Angus Beef*[®] (CAB[®]).

In November 2011, the historic Evenson

Angus Complete Cow Herd Dispersal marked the first-ever Angus registered females sold as breeding stock. The 2010 and 2011 heifer crops were retained to carry the program in the seventh decade. Today, the herd consists of 400 registered Angus cows for breeding stock and another 150 purebred Angus cows managed as commercials.

The operation continues to be familyowned by Bill and Eleanora Evenson, Trevor and Carrie Strand, Wally Evenson and Rodney Evenson.

Knop Angus Farm, Ida Grove, Iowa, has been recognized by the Association with the Historic Angus Herd Award. The farm began in 1941 with a 4-H purebred heifer project. The first cattle, bought in Nebraska and Iowa, contributed to a long line of showring success for Fred Knop's lineage.

The Knop family exhibited cattle at several major shows and earned some prestigious accomplishments along the way. One top honor was showing the junior champion bull and the reserve grand champion heifer at the 1974 International Live Stock Show in Chicago, Ill. Eugene Knop's daughter, Sheryl, received the top showman title and son Dennis showed the grand champion owned heifer at the 1981 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Nashville, Tenn. A year later, the family claimed the grand champion bred-and-owned heifer at the 1982 NJAS in Milwaukee, Wis.

The ownership changed to Eugene and Colleen Knop in 1969 and grew to 250 cows with two production sales per year. There are currently 50 cows in the herd owned and managed by Eugene and his son, Dan.

Hickory Knoll Angus, Gary Eichhorn and family, Tipton, Iowa, has been honored with the Historic Angus Herd Award.

The operation began in 1949, when Gary's grandfather, James Nowacheck, and father, Stanley Eichhorn, took him to the Lakewood Dispersion. Gary bought his first Angus heifer sired by Prince of Lakewood. His second Angus heifer purchase was in 1951 at the spring Hawkeye Angus Sale.

The base of the herd grew into a 250acre farm and partnership, Hickory Knoll Angus, Stanley Eichhorn and son. Eichhorn lineage has been added to the partnership CONTINUED ON PAGE **42**

The herd is now in its fifth generation of family operation and is managed by Gary. The herd consists of 40 head, and each year a calf crop is sold as breeding stock. It all goes back to the beginning, though, and the Eichhorn family credits Nowacheck for their passion and success in the cattle industry.

Before this operation, Nowacheck

had a herd of his own, which began in 1912. Nowacheck purchased a \$20 lifetime membership to the American Angus Association and began registering cattle. However, during the Depression era, Nowacheck ceased registration and continued with a commercial Angus herd.

Minish began his teaching career in 1962 at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech), where he was

ultimately named head of the Department of Animal and Poultry Sciences in 1994. During his 40 years of service, he has been a teacher, intercollegiate livestock judging team coach, student mentor and extension specialist. He served as dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences at Southern Illinois University from 2004 until his retirement in 2010. He is the recipient of numerous agriculture education and industry awards and widely recognized for his improvements to academic programs for animal science and agriculture. Today, he and wife Roberta live in Plano, Texas.

During his career, Minish contributed significantly to the livestock industry in the United States and abroad, as well as to higher education at every level. Early in his career he recognized the need for leaner, more heavily muscled and faster-growing cattle. He set out to educate the industry on the benefits of changing from the smaller, fatter cattle of the 1950s and 1960s. He wrote and spoke extensively on the subject, including co-authoring a textbook about beef production and management that supports the type change.

Because of his expertise and passion, he became one of the most sought-after beef cattle show judges in the 1970s and 1980s. He officiated at national shows for 10 breeds of cattle in more than 30 states and in Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, England, Scotland and Uruguay. He judged at nearly every leading American show, including the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago, the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver and the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville.

Minish has been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1957.

IN PASSING

Robert "Bob" McGuire, 80, died Feb. 27 at the University of Alabama (UAB) Hospital in Birmingham, Ala.

Bob was born Aug. 7, 1931, to Ralph



and Sallie McGuire in Brevard, N.C. He graduated from Brevard High School in 1950, where he lettered in football and was active in the Future Farmers of America organization. He attended Brevard College and was a member of the football team.

He married Ann Cudd June 20, 1954, and they moved to Raleigh, N.C., so he could resume his college studies. With Ann's help and support, he graduated with a bachelor's degree in animal husbandry from North Carolina State University (NC State) in 1957.

He served as assistant county agent in Durham County, N.C., then was an instructor of animal science at NC State, where he earned a master's degree in animal science in 1960. He worked as an extension animal husbandry specialist in the North Carolina Cooperative Extension Service. He earned a doctorate in animal physiology from the University of Kentucky in 1965.

After returning to positions at NC State, he served four years at the University of Georgia as an extension animal scientist. His career culminated with 19 years of service at Auburn University as head of extension animal science. He was named professor emeritus of animal science upon his retirement from Auburn in 1994.

Bob was an active member of the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS), serving on committees and the board at the national and regional level, including as president of the Southern Section in 1977-1978. Many family vacations revolved around attending the annual ASAS conferences, hosted at land-grant colleges across the country.

He served as superintendent of the National 4-H Livestock Judging Contest at the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago for four years in the 1960s and later served on the National 4-H Animal Science Program Development Committee. He judged livestock shows throughout the United States, including the NWSS.

In Alabama, he instituted the Alabama Purebred Beef Breeds Council and contributed extensively to the development of the Stocker-700 program. He served as president of the Lee County Cattlemen's Association, was named Father of the Year by the Lee County CattleWomen, was recognized with his family as the Alabama Angus Association Family of the Year in 1986, received the Beef Cattle Improvement Association (BCIA) Richard Deese Award in 1993, was named Alabama Limousin Breeder Kentucky Angus Ass'n Annual Meeting & Banquet, Louisville, March 2

He was inducted into the Alabama Livestock Hall of Fame in 1997, was honored as a Lifetime Director of the Alabama Cattlemen's Association, and was recognized by the Alabama Angus Association with a Lifetime Achievement Award in 2008.

Bob traveled to every county in Alabama, was a well-known speaker, making hundreds of presentations to agricultural organizations across the state, and wrote a popular monthly column for 19 years in the *Alabama Cattleman* magazine.

A lifelong Christian, educator and cattleman, Bob was an excellent husband, father, grandfather and uncle. He loved all of God's creation and never met a stranger. He coached championship Little League baseball teams and enjoyed all sports from NC State basketball to Atlanta Braves baseball to Auburn football.

Bob was ordained as a deacon at St. John's Baptist Church in Raleigh, N.C. He also served as a deacon at Auburn First Baptist Church, where he and Ann were longtime members of the Fishers Sunday School class.

After his retirement, Bob focused on McGuire Cattle Co. with his son, Mike, and pursued his hobby of raising mules, donkeys and horses. He restored his grandfather's wagon and participated in many wagon-ride events with family and his many friends.

Throughout his career and his active retirement, Bob's life truly embodied the ideals of the Extension Service creed. He continued as an avid supporter of youth livestock events and was proud of the participation and achievements of grandsons Clay and Reid.

Bob is survived by daughters Karen and Jan; son Mike; his wife, Jo Ann Baynard McGuire; sisters Margaret and Clara; and two grandsons.

Maralee Johnson, 61, Springfield, Ill., died March 21 at Saint John's Hospice.
