Mill Coulee Angus, Prairie du Chien, Wis., has been honored by the American Angus Association as a Historic Angus Herd.

The Mill Coulee Angus farm dates back to 1959 and continues to raise performance Angus cattle on the banks of the Mississippi river just north of Prairie du Chien. Bernard Pedretti; his wife, Darlene; and 11 children founded the ranch by purchasing the Frank Ahrens and Bros. herd. The initial purchase also included a bull from Lisle Blackburns, Cassville, Wis., and foundation female Deal of Ellon.

In 1980, the family expanded their operation by acquiring the D.P. Richards herd. That investment played a key role in the development of Mill Coulee Angus genetics. Today, half of the Coulee cows are descendants of a Richard's herd cow named Barbara Kindness. The daughter of Emulous 7067 spent 18 years in the Pedretti herd before she was sold in the fall of 1983.

Mill Coulee Angus has always focused on performance testing, which stems from Bernard Pedretti's involvement at the bull testing Hancock Station in central Wisconsin. During his involvement, he tested bulls in five different states — Indiana, Montana,

Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin — producing top-gaining bulls in four out of the five states.

A forward thinker, Bernard Pedretti was named Wisconsin's Seedstock Producer of the Year in 1984. The current Mill Coulee Angus ranch consists of 115 cows and is managed by Bernard Pedretti's sons, Tracy and Mark.

The Historic Angus Herd Award is presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

John and Bernadine Stegman, Spearville, Kan., were honored March 15 in Manhattan, Kan., as a Kansas Master Farmer and Master Farm Homemaker for 2012. The Stegmans were among six Kansas couples recognized for their leadership in agriculture, environmental stewardship and service to their communities by K-State Research and Extension and Kansas Farmer magazine. Robert and Sharon Scherman, Paola; Leon and Janet Sylvester, Wamego; Gary and Lynda Foster, Fort Scott; Charles and Anita Hummel, Hope; and Thomas and Marlysue Holmquist, Smolan, were also honored as

Kansas Master Farmers and Master Farm Homemakers in the award program, which dates to 1927.

Wheat, grain sorghum, corn and silage are all grown on the Stegmans' farm, along with pasture and fallow ground. They have 200 head of black Angus cows in their cow-calf operation, use embryo transfer to improve the genetics of their herd, and sell calves directly to the feedyard.

The Stegmans are conscious of the value of natural resources and use terraces and windbreaks in their operation. They attribute their success in agriculture to "forward thinking and a willingness to try new things." The family has invested in the Spearville Wind Farm and has wind towers located on their property.

The family consists of son Bernie and wife Debra; daughter Cheryl and husband Robert; daughter Carol and husband Wes; and seven grandchildren.

Stegman Farms has been a member of the American Angus Association since 2002.


