Creighton Barner, 83, Munden, Kan., died Feb. 17.

Creighton was born June 25, 1932, in Martelle, Iowa, to George and Gladys (Leinbaugh) Barner. He graduated from Martelle schools in 1949. He then went to the University of Dubuque in Dubuque, Iowa. While there he was a walk-on for the football team. After that first year he was granted a full-ride football scholarship. He majored in history and physical education. He was also on the wrestling team. His most famous wrestling opponent was later a linebacker for the Pittsburg Steelers, Art (Boom Boom) Mahaick.

After attending college, Creighton entered the Air Force in 1952. He joined the 1st Airborne Cadets in San Antonio, Texas. He came home and married Lola Horstmann on June 27, 1954, in Wheatland, Iowa. From that union there were five children born. Brenda, Bret, Becky, Bonita and Bart all live in Iowa.

Creighton operated the family farm for many years, raising purebred Angus cattle. He bought his first registered-Angus cow in 1954. He was also a county 4-H leader and an independent livestock truck driver for many years.

Later in his life, he married Mary Miller on June 3, 1982. Creighton continued raising Angus cattle and livestock trucking. He and Mary also enjoyed horses.

In addition to his wife, Creighton is survived by his children in Iowa; brother

Steven; a stepson; nine grandchildren; and many cousins, nieces, nephews, family and friends.

Robert "Bob" Koch, 91, Colorado Springs, Colo., died peacefully on March 10.

Bob was born in Sioux City, Iowa, May 15, 1924, to William and Geneva Koch. He had an older brother, Bill Jr., now deceased. Their mother, Geneva, passed away when they were 11 and 14 years old. Later, their father married Marian Tait, and after several years, a sister, Susan, was born. He grew up in Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, Oregon and Montana, graduating from Billings Senior High School in 1942.

Bob enlisted in the Army during WWII after a semester of college. After basic training, he was assigned to the Army Specialized Training Program (ASTP) in Stephenville, Texas. The ASTP offered fast-track degree programs for bright young recruits. Because of the heavy casualties during D-Day, ASTP was disbanded and he was assigned to the rifle companies of the 99th Infantry Division, Company E, 2nd Battalion, 395th Regiment.

In Europe, he participated in the Battle of the Bulge and received many medals and awards, including a Bronze Star. He attended the first Officer Candidate School in Europe (Paris) and left the service as a First Lieutenant in 1946. Bob enjoyed attending many reunions of the 99th Infantry Division, including one in Krinkelt, Belgium, where the local people unveiled a monument

honoring the 99th and hosted a reception in their honor.

Bob married his high school sweetheart, Virginia Terrett, in July 1946 and then returned to college. He graduated from Montana State University with a degree in animal science in 1948, and he received a master's degree in 1950 and a doctoral degree in 1953 from Iowa State University. He joined the Animal Science Department faculty at the University of Nebraska in 1950. His career with the university included serving as superintendent at the Fort Robinson Beef Cattle Research Station, Crawford, Neb., consultant at the University of Nebraska Mission in Colombia, South America, and as chairman of the Animal Science Department (seven years).

In 1966, Bob returned to research full time and in 1972 moved to the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center (USMARC) in Clay Center, Neb. There he, along with L.V. Cundiff and K.E. Gregory, launched the Germplasm Evaluation Program. The program was designed to characterize diverse cattle breeds and their utilization in alternative crossbreeding systems. He wrote and published his last research at the age of 80 in the *Journal of Animal Science*.

Bob received many research awards, including the Animal Breeding and Fellow Awards from the American Society of Animal Science and the Pioneer Award from the Beef Improvement Federation. Bob's research contributions are documented in more than 150 refereed scientific publications. He was invited to make numerous presentations at scientific meetings and beef industry meetings in the United States and in other countries, including Argentina, Australia, New Zealand, Colombia, Mexico, Brazil, Spain, the United Kingdom, France and Canada.

His hobbies included gardening, woodworking and hunting. His grandchildren loved to visit and help him pick ripe vegetables. In the summer, their dinner table included a freshly arranged summer bouquet of flowers from Grandmother Virginia's flower garden and fresh vegetables from Granddad Bob's garden. Each visit also included a trip to the university or research center to see the cattle involved in his research studies.

Bob has a loving family; his wife, Virginia,

He loved scenic drives through the mountains along with many family dinners and celebrations. Bob's ashes will be placed with his beloved Virginia in the columbarium at Holy Trinity Church in Lincoln, Neb., and also next to his beloved mother, Geneva, in Sioux City, Iowa, where he wanted his marker engraved "Loving Son of Geneva."

Gordon Ferguson, 75, Columbia, Mo., died March 15 at Boone Hospital Center surrounded by his loving family.

Gordon was born May 2, 1940, in Saint Charles, Mo., to Arthur and Olivia

(VanHouten) Ferguson. He was their only child. He graduated from Centralia High School in 1958 and went on to graduate from the University of Missouri–Columbia with a bachelor's degree in agriculture in 1962 and a master's in education in 1987. He proudly served in the United States Army National Guard from 1962 to 1968. He was also a member of Rising Sun Baptist Church.

Gordon was a true cowboy. He grew up showing cattle and helping his father at various Angus farms around the country. In 1962 Gordon left home to work at Blue Sky Farm in Kearney, Mo. Often hailed as "the best times of his life," he went on the road with Blue Sky's string of Angus cattle and showed many champions along the way.

He exhibited at the Missouri State Fair, the American Royal in Kansas City, the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago, the National Western Stock Show in Denver, the Grand National Livestock Show at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, the Arizona Livestock Show, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the Fort Worth Livestock Show and the Western States Angus Futurity, where they had supreme champion heifer in 1965 and were recognized on stage at the Stardust Hotel in Las Vegas.

He cherished this time in his life and the many lifelong friends he made along the way.

Gordon was a talented calf roper and was a member of the United Rodeo Association. In the summer of 1969 he was able to spend the entire summer competing at rodeos all around the Midwest with his horse, Punk.

On Feb. 10, 1973, Gordon was united in marriage to Sandra (Graham) Ferguson in Richmond, Mo. They settled in Columbia close to his parents and raised their own herd of Angus cattle. He raised club calves and was proud to have raised the 1993 champion steer at the North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville and several champions his daughters exhibited at local shows, county fairs and the Missouri State

Gordon spent 13 years as an over-the-road driver for Ward Trucking and went on to work at Dimensions in Wood for 25 years. He loved to read and learn, becoming a talented woodworker and machinist. The last several years he fabricated and machined parts and built small hit-and-miss engines. Gordon made many friends throughout his life and was always there to lend a helping hand. He always had a good story to tell and will be missed by many.

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Gordon and Sandra had 43 wonderful years together. He passed on his love of livestock, showing and hard work to his daughters, Carrie and Amy. He especially loved watching his children grow up and loved the family vacations they took to Florida and Branson.

In addition to his wife, Gordon is survived by daughters Carrie (John) and Amy (Jason), granddaughters Jillian and Adrienne, and mother-in-law Beulah Graham.

David McMahon Sr., 84, Fort Smith, Ark., died March 23 due to complications of mitral valve failure. He was born March 26, 1931, in Clarksville, Ark., to Donald and Marguerite Dixon Tyson McMahon. He was the owner of Belle Point Beverages Inc. and Belle Point Ranch. He was a member of Immaculate Conception Church and a follower and patron of Subiaco Abbey.

David was a man of vision and integrity. He celebrated imagination and worked to develop his innovative ideas. He eagerly served God, his family and his fellow man. He was a connector of people, a collaborator in projects, and a collector of friends. He embraced giving as an opportunity.

In 1936, David's parents and their three sons returned to Fort Smith where his father was engaged in a wholesale grocery business. Ten years later, his father began distributing Anheuser-Busch products. David was educated at Immaculate Conception School. Fort Smith Public Schools, and Oklahoma A&M College in Stillwater. In 1953, he earned a bachelor's degree in agriculture, majoring in animal husbandry. While in college, David was a member of Kappa Sigma Fraternity and served in the Army ROTC program. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army and earned the rank of captain. His two years of active duty included one year in Korea. He served four years as an officer in the Army Reserve.

In 1955, David rejoined his family's Anheuser-Busch distributorship. Upon his father's death in 1965, he assumed leadership of the company now known as Belle Point Beverages Inc. He served on the first Anheuser-Busch Wholesaler Advisory Panel from 1968 to 1971. This panel established the Wholesaler Equity Agreement, a standard of business that is still honored today. This year marks 70 years of exclusive partnership with Anheuser-Busch, providing sales and service to retailers in Arkansas and Oklahoma.

David married Mary Ann Lovoi in 1953, having known her since kindergarten. They raised five children on their 40 acres in south Fort Smith, educating them at Immaculate Conception School, Saint Anne's and Southside High Schools, in the 4-H program, the University of Arkansas and Oklahoma State University (OSU). Although David grew up showing gaited horses, he discovered a passion for purebred cattle in his college years. In 1975 the McMahons established Belle Point Ranch in Lavaca as a second family business. The ranch quickly grew to national prominence in the Angus breed. His children, their spouses and his grandchildren are all involved in the annual Angus production sale each spring.

David served on the American Angus Association Board of Directors, the first Board of Directors of Certified Angus Beef LLC, and as co-chair of the Angus Foundation Leadership Cabinet.

In the local community he provided leadership to the Subiaco Monastery President's Council; Immaculate Conception Church Finance Committee; the Catholic Education Endowment Fund, serving as general chairman; Saint Edward Mercy

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Medical Center Board of Advisors; Sparks Hospital Foundation Board; and the University of Arkansas–Fort Smith Foundation Board.

He was a devoted contributor and tireless worker for youth development. In addition to employing hundreds of high school students over the years at Belle Point Ranch, he was passionate about Immaculate Conception School, 4-H, Boy Scouts, junior livestock auctions, the Boys Shelter and Girls Shelter, and state and national junior Angus associations. Because he believed that youth programs shape individuals into productive citizens and the leaders of tomorrow, he supported these programs, and many others, with his time, knowledge and checkbook.

He was twice distinguished with Rotary International's Paul Harris Fellow Award, as well as OSU's Graduate of Distinction, and the University of Arkansas Animal Science Award.

In addition to his wife of 62 years, David is survived by daughters Mary Lynn, Kathleen, Julie and Susan; son David Jr.; brother Jim; 11 grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter. The McMahons wish to recognize and thank many loyal employees and business associates — present

and past — who were truly family to David.
