Archie Hamilton, 86, Ava, Ill., died May 12 in the Missouri-Baptist Hospital in Saint Louis. Mo.

Archie was born Nov. 5, 1923, in Cora, Ill., to Archie Sr. and Eula (Clendenin) Hamilton. He married Eileen Heins May 10, 1947, at Christ Lutheran Church in Jacob, Ill.

He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving from July 1945 to January 1947 during WW

II. During his venue he served a one-year term of duty in Germany in the 331st Military Police Unit.

Archie was the founder of Hamilton Angus Farms in 1938. He was in the Angus business for 72 years, starting with help from

his ag teacher by purchasing his first Angus heifer as a youngster. After returning from the military his love of Angus cattle did not diminish. His family farm was the heart of the family.

From early mornings to late nights Archie always had the best interest of his family, Angus cattle and his farm in mind. Along with this, he always found time to be heavily involved in his church and community. As the Angus breed progressed, Archie's goal was to raise superior, functionally sound, performance-oriented cattle for friends, neighbors and local customers.

As time progressed, Archie and Eileen's three sons, Kenny, Glenn and Don, offered a driving force to Archie and the Angus breed. All three grew up showing Angus cattle and continue to this day. In later years, Archie enjoyed his two grandsons, Doug and Dusty, as well as his granddaughters Kim, Kelly and Kayla showing his Angus cattle.

Archie had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1948. He was a member of the Illinois Angus Association and the Southwestern Illinois Angus Association, and Hamilton Angus is a member of the Wabash Valley Angus Association.

Archie was a trusted and loyal director of the Egyptian Electric Cooperative for 37 years. For 24 years, he was a devoted member of the board of education for the Mississippi Valley School District 166 board, serving as president of the board for several years.

He was a member of the Kaskaskia VFW Post 33533 of Chester, Ill.; B.B.K. American Legion Post 480 of Steeleville, Ill.; the Jackson County Farm Bureau; Southern Illinois Power Coop; the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives; a charter member of the Mississippi Valley Gun Club; and a member of the Chester Valley High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

At the time of his death he was serving as the Degognia Township Clerk. Archie was a member of Christ Lutheran Church in Jacob.

Archie is survived by his wife; sons Kenneth, Glenn and Don; and five grandchildren.

Jerald "Jerry" Morrow, 84, Pickens, Miss., a well-known cattleman and dog trainer/breeder died May 16.

Jerry was born Oct. 25, 1925, to Ira and Martha (Breen) Morrow in Crested Butte, Colo. His family owned and operated the Puritan Dairy in Kemmerer, Wyo. He served in the Air Force during World War II. He graduated from the University of Wyoming with a bachelor's degree in animal science.

Jerry worked in the agriculture industry and managed multiple cattle operations throughout North America. He served as regional manager and director of regional managers for the American Angus Association in Saint Joseph, Mo. He was the executive vice president of the International Brangus Breeders Association and president of the *Brangus Journal* in San Antonio, Texas.

Jerry served as president of the National Pedigreed Livestock Council (NPLC) and formed the Wineglass Genetics consulting firm, which serviced individual cattle operations in which he formulated a new breed of cattle, Angus Plus. He later served as the foreign marketing consultant with the American Angus Association in Mexico and South America. Upon retiring, he devoted his talents to breeding and training Labrador retriever dogs at Wineglass Kennels in Pickens, Miss.
