Coulter Angus, Congerville, Ill., has been recognized by the American Angus Association as a Historic Angus Herd.

Kenneth Coulter was 15 years old when he purchased his first Angus heifer, bred by Eglin Bros. Farm, in 1937. The heifer was popular in the showring and won championship titles at many shows, including junior champion at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo.

As a young man, Kenneth helped fit and exhibit the Central Illinois Association show herd across the country. After serving in the Air Corps, he continued his passion for Angus and acquired more cattle to expand his herd.

Many animals in the herd originated from Timberline Farms and Central Illinois Angus sales. Through the years, they used Timberline bulls and purchased bulls from Ankony Angus and other operations. Coulter Angus was also an early adopter of artificial insemination (AI) in the 1960s and still uses the technology on the herd today.

The Coulter family grew in a similar fashion. Together with his wife, Madeline, and their four children, they showed cattle at numerous county, state and national shows and were very involved in 4-H. The Coulter children's herd helped finance the four children's college educations.

The Coulter Angus herd currently numbers around 50 head of cows with ownership from son Kevin Coulter and grandson Matt Coulter.

The Historic Angus Herd Award is

presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

Robin Ruff has been named the new director of activities, events and education for the American Angus Association.

In her new position, Ruff will work with members to coordinate events, such as the Beef Leaders Institute, Cattlemen's Boot Camps, Angus activities at the NWSS and more. She will also oversee the Association's award programs, including the Angus Heritage Foundation, Historic and Century awards. In addition, Ruff is responsible for coordinating about 17 nationwide Roll of Victory (ROV) shows throughout the year.

Ruff says she is looking forward to expanding the Association's educational outreach. One example will be the 2014

National Angus Convention and Trade Show in Kansas City. The event marks a dramatic departure from the traditional annual business meeting, which has been in Louisville, Ky., during most of the last four decades. The 2014 event will include educational workshops, a trade show featuring allied industry partners, top-flight keynote speakers and several social activities.

During her time with the Association, Ruff has served as the junior activities assistant and director of junior activities. She planned and managed the premier event of the beef industry — the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS); served as advisor to the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) Board of Directors; arranged annual Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conferences; and coordinated several other youth leadership events.

A Kansas native, Ruff grew up in Hanston on a family-owned operation with around 200 head of cattle. She holds a bachelor's degree in agribusiness from Kansas State University, and is expected to graduate with her master's degree in youth development in 2014.

Ruff is active in the community through the Saint Joseph Junior League, Trails West[®] Arts and Musical Festival, and Big Brothers, Big Sisters.

Bradley 3 Ranch, Memphis, Texas, was named 2013 Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) Seedstock Producer of the Year during the annual BIF Research Symposium & Convention in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Bradley 3 Ranch was started in 1955 with the purchase of 20 registered-Angus cows. Today, the herd is one of the few Angus herds in the country that has maintained more than 200 registered-Angus cows for more than 50 years. Located in the southeast part of the Texas Panhandle, much of the ranch is rough, with canyons, draws, mesquite and cedar trees. Bradley 3 Ranch is currently home to 400 registered-Angus cows and is managed by Mary Lou Bradley-Henderson, Minnie Lou Bradley and James Henderson.

Early on, the Bradleys were committed to a disciplined approach to performance. As one of the first members of the American Beef Cattle Performance Registry, they maintained an emphasis on performance that is still the foundation of the herd today.

In 1986, the Bradleys started B3R Country

Meats. In the next 16 years, they built the all-natural meat company to a 125-head-per-day harvest facility that harvested more than 30,000 head in 2002, the year it was sold. Customers were both beef producers and beef consumers. The beef producers were part of one of the earliest value-based marketing systems in the United States.

Bradley 3 Ranch has been a member of the American Angus Association since 1958.

Darnall Ranch, Harrisburg, Neb., was named 2013 BIF Commercial Producer of the Year.

Darnall Ranch Inc., managed by Gary and Lane Darnall, is a family owned cow-calf operation, feedlot and farm located in the panhandle of Nebraska, 30 miles southeast of Scottsbluff, Neb. The ranch was originally homesteaded in 1889 by Scott Darnall and incorporated in 1973.


The 124-year-old family ranch now includes some seventh-generation youngsters helping out with 1,700 commercial Angus cows and the Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB)-licensed feedlot. Today, the cow herd consists of 1,700 commercial Angus females that produce 300-400 replacement heifers annually. Bulls are developed using expected CONTINUED ON PAGE 46

progeny differences (EPDs), genomics and the GrowSafe system.

The balance of Darnall Ranch offspring are fed out in the 22,500-head CAB-licensed commercial feedlot, where records are collected for conversion, rate of gain, and grade and yield, along with a profitability analysis each year.

Darnall Ranch strives to use the land and cattle as an efficient and economical multi-generational agribusiness. Twenty-five thousand acres of grassland, 2,400 acres of irrigated and 4,700 acres of dryland farm ground are used to grow the feedstuffs to help support the cow-calf, yearling and feedlot operations.

Kevin and his wife, Noreen, own and operate Blair's Ag Cattle Co. with their family and support staff. For more than 35 years, Blair's family has been involved in the purebred beef industry. Most recently, their primary focus has been red and black Angus for a total of 350 producing purebred females. Their operation includes an extensive embryo program and 10,000 acres of grain and pasture located in Lanigan.

Blair's Ag has gathered proven cows and cow families from reputable breeders across Western Canada in hopes of making a bigribbed, tanky female for today's cattlemen. They focus on maternal traits, and it is with this in mind that they hold an annual spring bull sale.

Blair is a strong supporter of the Canadian Junior Angus program and the Canadian Angus Foundation (CAF). Blair's Ag offers

a scholarship program to youths who purchase heifer projects from them. They have also been strong supporters of the CAF Building the Legacy Sale, which has raised more than \$110,000 for Canadian Angus youth programs over the past two years.

Corinne Gibson of Fir Mountain, Sask., was chosen as president-elect and will support Blair in this role. Gibson operates Six Mile Red Angus with her family, which has been proudly raising Angus cattle since 1954. She and her husband, Clayton, had their 36th annual bull sale in April. Gibson takes pride in her family-oriented, progressive, pioneer program.

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Padlock Ranch, Ranchester, recipient of the 2013 Leopold Conservation Award in Wyoming, was honored for voluntary achievement in conservation by Governor Matt Mead at the Wyoming Cattle Industry Convention & Trade Show in Cheyenne.

The \$10,000 Leopold Conservation Award (www.leopoldconservationaward.org), named for renowned conservationist Aldo Leopold, was presented to Padlock Ranch by Sand County Foundation, Wyoming Stock Growers Association (WSGA) and Peabody Energy.

Padlock Ranch operates a sustainable and profitable cattle operation on 500,000 acres in Wyoming and Montana. In addition to being a successful and sustainable cattle ranch raising natural beef, Padlock offers vacationing guests an opportunity to share in the Western lifestyle through working ranch, hunting and fishing, and photography vacations.

Homer and Mildred Scott started Padlock Ranch in 1943 with 300 cows and 3,000 acres. It has grown to 11,000 head of cattle on land straddling the Wyoming/Montana state line.

Today, the operation is led by Wayne

Fahsholtz, who manages the resources and assets of the ranch for long-term sustainability, while conserving and improving the environment through good grazing and other practices.

"We believe that if we can graze in a manner that protects habitat, and if the wildlife species that should be here are here, then we are doing the job we set out to do," Fahsholtz noted.

Dustin Focht, Stillwater, Okla., was named champion of the 2013 World Livestock Auctioneer Championship (WLAC) at the 50th anniversary of the contest sponsored by the Livestock Marketing Association (LMA) and hosted by Montgomery Stockyards, Montgomery, Ala.

A latecomer to the livestock auctioneering profession, Focht, 43, whose grandfather was a livestock auctioneer, didn't begin selling until 13 years ago. He credits fellow Oklahoma auctioneers Ralph Wade and Greg Griffith with helping to form him into the world champion auctioneer he is today.

"I had never sold anything or had a chant before I met Ralph. He took a complete beginner and in two days taught me the basics and put me in the block at Oklahoma National Stockyards," Focht explains. "Greg taught me all the values that exemplify an auctioneer: professionalism, integrity, honesty and value."

Focht says patience, preparation and the experience of 11 previous WLAC contests gave him the confidence and ability to win this year's contest. Focht, who also earned the high score in the interview contest, says during the contest he worked on relaxing, being professional and doing the best auctioneering job he could with the tough competition he faced.

Focht was sponsored by Cherokee Sales Co. LLC, Cherokee, Okla.; Woodward Livestock Auction Inc., Woodward, Okla.; and Anthony Livestock Sales Co., Anthony, Kan. This year's champion takes home a customized 2013 Ford F-150 pickup to use during the year of his reign; \$5,000 cash; a championship sculpture; world champion Gist belt buckle and hand-tooled leather briefcase from LMA; world champion ring sponsored by Montgomery Stockyards; the Golden Gavel Award sponsored by the World Wide College of Auctioneering; and a James Reid Ltd. money clip sponsored by *cattleusa.com*.

Also making a great showing were the reserve champion **Brian Little**, Wann, Okla., and runner-up champion **Blaine Lotz**, Edna, Kan. Little was sponsored by Coffeyville Livestock Market LLC, Coffeyville, Kan. As reserve champion, Little received \$2,000 cash, a Gist knife and reserve champion Gist belt buckle from LMA.

Lotz was sponsored by South Coffeyville Stockyards Inc., South Coffeyville, Okla.; Fredonia Livestock Auction, Fredonia, Kan.; and Tulsa Stockyards Inc., Tulsa, Okla. He took home \$1,000 cash, a Gist knife and runner-up Gist belt buckle sponsored by LMA.

Thirty of the semi-finalists were selected during four quarterfinals hosted during the year at different livestock markets in the United States. As the International Livestock Auctioneer Champion is always given a "bye" to become an automatic semi-finalist, Jack qualified as the champion from Canada.

When not on the auction block at the livestock markets he works, Focht will spend his year traveling the country sharing his auctioneering skills with other livestock markets, and acting as a spokesperson for the industry.

Focht has been a member of the Association since 2006.
