Black Grove, Newberry, S.C., has received the Historic Herd Award from the American Angus Association. The award is presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

The Black Grove herd began in 1962 and continues today with founder Walter Shealy III. Shealy's interest in cattle began while showing Angus heifers in 4-H; he credits Ollie Dunkle, his county extension agent, and his parents for his success in the Angus business.

As his passion for the cattle industry continued to grow, so did his herd. At the age of 14, Shealy purchased his first cow for \$135 from Elmer Epting of Newberry. When he was 16 years old, Shealy received a loan to begin Black Grove farm, which now consists of 400 acres and 155 head of Angus cattle.

Shealy and his son, Dixon, still manage the farm with the philosophy, "Fundamentals survive fads." Black Grove farm consists of cattle chosen with multiple selection criteria, including longevity, performance, expected progeny differences (EPDs) and carcass data.

Shealy continues to stay busy with his interests in agriculture and chairs several committees to help continue the future of the industry. He serves as board chairman for Boys Farm Inc., director of South Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities, and committee chairman for the South Carolina Angus Association Hall of Fame. Previous involvement includes serving as president for the South Carolina Angus Association, and on the board of directors for the South Carolina Angus Association.

Shealy has been a life member of the Association since 1970.

Andrea Stroberg, Manhattan, Kan., attended the second installment of the 2012 Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) Young Stockmen's Academy (YSA) in the Kansas City, Kan., area June 25-27. The class of 20 young members from across the state spent three days learning about the agribusiness and retail beef industries.

Merck Animal Health hosted the members at its office in DeSoto, with Jeff Baxter, senior marketing manager, discussing the challenges facing the livestock industry, including providing substantially more food to feed a population that is expected to double by 2050.

The group toured Sysco Food Services, Bichelmeyer Meats and Whole Foods Market to gain a better understanding of the link between the processing plant and the consumer's plate. The class also had a chance to visit with consumers about the beef they produce on their farms and ranches while distributing samples of the flat iron and tritip steaks at Hen House and two Hy-Vee grocery store locations. The young producers answered questions about animal health, beef nutrition and cooking methods.

During the three-day tour, the group visited Applebee's corporate offices to learn how the company markets beef in its 2,000 restaurants and heard from staff at Bartlett and Co., about risk management in the cattle and grain industries.

The third installment of the YSA class will be in October. Members will tour Kansas beef and dairy operations to gain a better understanding of each industry segment.

He owned and operated Cotton's Corner, a convenience store and restaurant, for 32

years until he sold it in 2010. In 1998, Cotton, William Coleman and Judy Hodnett bought Willow Run Retirement Home. They sold this successful business in 2011. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Greensboro, joining at the age of 9.

Throughout his life, he was a dedicated farmer, primarily of beef cattle, and an advocate of agriculture in Greene County. He was very concerned about the future of agriculture throughout the United States. He was recently named Agribusinessman of the Year by the Greene County Chamber of Commerce. He served on two Nathanael Greene Academy Boards and two terms as a Greene County Commissioner from 1993-1996, and again from 2003-2005, where, at his request, he received no pay for his first term in office.

Cotton employed many people during his working years, and he was a faithful friend to many during his lifetime. All of his life, he was a credit to his community, county and his family. Cotton always thought that growing up in Greene County was a privilege and an honor.
