Ronald "Ronnie" Blackwell, 75, Amarillo, Texas, died Aug. 22.

Ronnie was born Feb. 15, 1933, in Lexington, Okla., to Elight and Vee Blackwell. He grew up in Lexington, working on the family farm at the edge of town and graduating from Lexington High School. While attending Oklahoma State University (OSU) Ronnie worked at the movie theater in Stillwater, Okla. After earning a bachelor's degree at OSU, he went to work for the Poland China Association in Chicago, Ill.

Ronnie was drafted and served in the Army for two years before returning to work in Fort Worth, Texas, for the Texas Angus Association. While there, he met Carolyn Crawford. They were married Jan. 17, 1959, in Amarillo. He later went to work for the American Angus Association as director of field services.

In August 1969, Ronnie took a job at the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA). He was in charge of public relations until he became the executive vice president of the association. He worked at AOHA for 23 years.

LMA, the national trade association for livestock marketing businesses, created and conducts the annual WLAC. The championship in Minnesota will be the 46th annual.

This is the third year LMA has used the four-contest format to qualify contestants for the June championship. Contestants must be at least 18 years old, and employed and sponsored by a livestock market. Each contest is an actual sale, with buyers on the seats.
