Maguire Blair, Drake, Sask., Canada, has earned the 2016 Junior Angus Stockman Award from the Canadian Angus Foundation.

In addition to involvement with Blair's West Land & Cattle, his family's operation near Drake, Blair has developed his own herd of purebred Angus cattle. He makes all the breeding decisions for his females, and has been slowly expanding his herd through female purchases and embryo transfer. Blair's future plans include attending Lakeland College in Vermilion, majoring in animal science and crop technology.

Blair has been very active through 4-H and junior programs and attends 10-12 shows each year across western Canada. He has earned many awards for his skills in grooming and showmanship and has also exhibited high-quality breeding stock. This past year, Blair's cow Bar-E-L Erica 74A was the most dominant show female in Canada, winning championships at Showdown, Lloydminster, Stockade National Angus Show, Brandon Ag Expo, Farmfair and Agribition. Erica was named Canadian Angus Gold Show Female of the Year and also won the international "Show Female of the Year" from AngusBreeder.net.

The Junior Angus Stockman of the Year Award is a recent initiative of the Canadian Angus Foundation, introduced last year to recognize those outstanding young cattlemen who are constantly growing their stockmanship capability by actively working with their Angus cattle.

Rae-Leigh Pederzolli, Medicine Hat, Alta., Canada, and Nicky Lansink, Three Hills, Alta., were selected as winners of the \$10,000 Keith Gilmore Foundation (KGF) Prize for Beef Cattle Innovation. The KGF Prize is awarded to students who are recognized for academic excellence; leadership; and commitment to pursue a career to improve, support and promote the beef cattle industry.

The KGF Prize and Keith Gilmore Foundation are Canadian Hereford Association initiatives; however, the award seeks to acknowledge beef industry research and leadership in the fields of agriculture,

veterinary medicine and ag journalism rather than specific breed projects. The Canadian Angus Association (CAA) is proud to claim Rae-Leigh Pederzolli as a member of Canada's Angus fraternity. She is a commercial cattle producer with an Angus-influenced herd and the granddaughter of Aldo Pederzolli, who received a 50 Year Heritage Award from CAA in 2015. Pederzolli is also a graduate of the Cattlemen's Young Leaders program and was mentored by CAA Director of Breed Development Kajal Devani.

Pederzolli is completing a master's degree at the University of Saskatchewan and will be attending the University of Calgary this fall pursuing a doctorate in veterinary medicine. **Robert (Bob) Gordon,** beloved husband, father and grandfather, died July 29 with family by his side at Boissevain, Man., Canada.

Bob was born Nov. 13, 1932, in Oak Lake, Man., to the late Henry and Ella (Ronberg) Gordon

Growing up in the 1930s, Bob loved the country and farm lifestyle, and 4-H. At an early age he had a dream of becoming a registered-livestock breeder. In 1946, Bob exhibited his first steer at the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair in Brandon and continued showing there for more than four decades, later showing at Denver, Chicago, Toronto Royal, Ag-Ex, Canadian Western Agribition, and world Angus and Hereford shows until his retirement.

Bob's family moved to Souris, Man., in 1955. He married Joyce (Honeyman) of Hayfield, Man., in 1959. In 1961, his family was in the dairy business shipping milk for 10 years. Bob and his brother Wayne formed Kinnaber Cattle Co., establishing a Shorthorn operation. Bob was named "Builder of the Shorthorn Breed" in 1970 by the Shorthorn Country and American Shorthorn Association. He was instrumental in forming the Canadian Shorthorn Lassie Organization and president and director of the Manitoba Shorthorn Club. Kinnaber won three consecutive grand champion females and two reserve grand champions between 1969 and 1971 at the National Western Stock Show in Denver and two champions at the 1968 and 1969 Chicago International. Bob judged many livestock shows, including Agribition, Toronto Royal, 4-H achievement days and U.S. state fairs.

While serving on the Manitoba Cattle Producers board, Bob and fellow cattlemen initiated the Douglas Bull Test Station in the late 1960s. In 1969, he served as the first president and founding partner of Bar-5 Simmentals in Brandon, Man. Bob initiated the importation of Simmental cattle from Europe. Achilles Cattle Co. hired Bob as manager to promote and sell Simmental semen all over the world.

In the 1970s, the Hereford herd was established when his children's love for showing cattle began. While serving as director of the Canadian Hereford Association, he initiated the formation of the Canadian Junior Hereford Association (CJHA), hosting the inaugural youth event at Kinnaber in 1979. Bob was intrigued by the Angus breed and developed a small herd in the 1980s. His experience with multiple breeds led him to be named sire selector and manager of the beef program for Western Breeders/Alta Genetics in Balzac, Alta., in 1985, selecting beef sires for the North American market for 13 years.

Bob was inducted into the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame in 1995. In 2007, Bob and Joyce were inducted into the Manitoba Agricultural Hall of Fame for their contribution to agriculture and the beef industry.

In 2003, Bob and Joyce wrote *A Cattleman's Walk Down Memory Lane*, a book chronicling their lifelong experiences in farming and the livestock industry. Bob and Joyce retired to Boissevain in 2008.

In addition to his loving wife of 56 years,

Bob is survived by children Lois, Shirley, Sheila, B. Lynn and Bruce; brother Wayne; sister Cheryl; and 10 grandchildren.

Bob's family will remember, "A true stockman never dies; he's just selected by the best judge of all."

### J.L. (James Lish) Hoskins, 92,

Hustonville, Ky., died Sept. 4 at Baptist Health Lexington.

J.L. was born Sept. 27, 1923, in Casey County, Ky., the son of the late William and Pearl (Bell) Hoskins.

A lifetime farmer in Lincoln and Casey County, J.L. raised tobacco and Angus cattle. In his more than 70 years raising Angus, he sold cattle across Kentucky and the surrounding states. He and his daughters participated in local, state and national Angus cattle shows for many years.

J.L. had a busy personal life. He was an active member of the Hustonville Baptist Church, serving as Sunday school teacher, chairman of the ushers and as a trustee. He was a founding member of the Central Kentucky Angus Association and later served as director and president. He had been a lifetime member of the American Angus Association since 1950 and served as a delegate representing Kentucky at the Annual Meeting. He was a director of the Kentucky Angus Association and Peoples Bank. He was a member of Lincoln County Farm Bureau, Hustonville Ruritan and a Kentucky Colonel.

He was presented with the American Angus Association's Historic Herd Award, Kentucky Angus Lifetime Achievement Award, Kentucky Angus Performance Breeder of the Year Award, Honorary Commissioner of Agriculture, and Lincoln County Outstanding Farmer. He was a salesman for Bluegrass Fertilizer Co., sold Vigertone mineral for 35 years, and was a tobacco solicitor for the Burley Tobacco Warehouse for 40 years.

J.L. was a loving and supportive husband, father and grandfather. He and Evelyn (Allen) Hoskins celebrated 70 years of marriage Jan. 19, 2016. In addition to Evelyn, he is survived by daughters Donna and Rita; grandchildren James, Kindra and Kandis; great-grandchildren Addison, Bennett, David, Andrew, Kinnedy and Kade Nicholas, due in November.
