The American Angus Association has honored **Clarence Frey,** Mulhall, Okla., with the Historic Angus Herd Award.

Frey purchased his first Angus heifer, Blackbird 177 of PSF, from the Pfeiffer Angus Farm Production Sale in 1952. His \$250 FFA project jump-started his Angus herd as she gave birth to heifer calves for several years. He joined the Association in May 1957.

The objective at Frey Angus has always been to raise productive, maternal, eyeappealing cattle that produce a high-quality end product. The Oklahoma State University (OSU) graduate utilized artificial insemination (AI) and turned weights into the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®) program to reach his goals. Bulls are tested at Oklahoma Beef Inc. (OBI), at Stillwater. For many years, bulls and females have been marketed through OBI sales, consignment sales and private treaty. Today's herd consists of nearly 150 cows. Frey has served as a voting delegate to

the American Angus Association Annual Meeting for 22 years. In 2006, the U.S. Army veteran was inducted into the Oklahoma Angus Hall of Fame.

Frey and his wife, Anita, were married in 1961 and have two children, Mike and Shelia. They were active as juniors and remain invested in the more than 50-year operation. Frey's grandchildren have already started showing and building their own Angus herds.

The American Angus Association presents the Historic Angus Herd Award to Angus herds that have been in the continuous production of registered Angus cattle by the same family for 50 years or more.

Ron Meyer, Fremont, Neb., received an award from the Nebraska Junior Angus Association (NJAA) to honor his devotion to the Angus breed and his 23 years of work for the Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children in Fremont, from which he retired Sept. 28.

The award was presented during the 4-H

breeding heifer show at the Nebraska State Fair Sept. 1. During the years Meyer worked for the Home, he mentored more than 600 youth who received more than 15,000 Angus and 4-H awards. Thirty young residents of the Home have participated in the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), and two young women have been Nebraska Angus queens.

The NJAA wanted to thank Meyer for what he has done for the junior and adult Angus organizations in Nebraska while working with youth who have challenges unimaginable to most people.

Julie Schaff Ellingson has been named the North Dakota Stockmen's Association (NDSA) executive vice president to replace Wade Moser when he retires in December. Moser served NDSA for 26 years, the organization's longest-serving executive vice president and the nation's second-longest-serving state cattlemen's association executive officer.

Ellingson, a Saint Anthony, N.D., native, has been the communications director for NDSA for 13 years. As communications director, she has served as an association lobbyist, a public relations officer and as the editor and advertising manager of the The North Dakota Stockman magazine. Under her leadership, the magazine has won several awards from the National Federation of Press Women (NFPW) and the Livestock Publications Council (LPC), and it has set new size records. During her tenure, Ellingson also coordinated many association activities and programs, such as the NDSA Spring Roundups and the beef industry Military Appreciation Day.

In addition to her association work, Ellingson and her husband, Chad, own and operate a registered Angus ranch along with their children, Stetson, Jameson, Sierra, Medora and Sheridan. They are active members of several industry organizations, including the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA), the American Angus Association and the North Dakota Angus Association.
