Brandon Neely, Southside, Ala., won the Livestock Marketing Association (LMA) Sept. 19 first qualifying contest for the 2012 World Livestock Auctioneer Championship (WLAC). Neely finished first in a field of 24 contestants, following competition at Farmers Livestock Market of Glasgow, Glasgow, Ky. Reserve champion was Darren Carter, Ninety Six, S.C., and runner-up champion was Brian Little, Wann, Okla. The three champions now move on to next summer's WLAC, along with the next five top scorers at Glasgow. They are, in alphabetical order, Will Epperly, Moneta, Va.; Tom Frey, Creston, Iowa; Blake McDaniel, Tuscumbia, Ala.; Paul Ramirez, Tucson, Ariz.; and Jay Romine, Mount Washington, Ky.

The remaining qualifying contests are Oct. 20, at Stockmen's Livestock Exchange Inc., Dickinson, N.D.; Jan. 17, at Producers Livestock Marketing Association, Greeley, Colo.; and March 8, at Groesbeck Auction and Livestock Co. Inc., Groesbeck, Texas.

The eight highest scorers in each qualifying contest, along with the reigning International Livestock Auctioneer Champion — Rod Burnett, Armstrong, B.C. — make up the field of 33 for the 2012 WLAC, scheduled for June 16 at Turlock Livestock Auction Yard Inc., Turlock, Calif.

Clayton Carpenter, 98, Sauk Centre, Minn., died July 2 at Saint Michael's Nursing Home in Sauk Centre.

Clayton was born Dec. 22, 1912, in Sauk Centre to Dwight and Bertha (Robertson) Carpenter. After graduating from high school, Clayton attended Saint Cloud State University. He served in the U.S. Navy for three years during World War II. His tours took him to the South Pacific, Guam, Guadalcanal and Iwo Jima. When Clayton came home he resumed farming and became very prominent in the Minnesota Angus cattle farming community. He continued farming until he retired in 1996.

Clayton was a lifelong member of the Paul F. Donart VFW Post 2853, the Minnesota Angus Association, and had been a life member the American Angus Association since 1942. Survivors include brother Cy and sisters Mildred, Alta and Jeanette.

Wayne Schurr, 38, Maywood, Colo., died Sept. 8 at Denver Health Medical Center in Denver, Colo., as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident west of Maywood.

Wayne was born Oct. 30, 1972, at Gothenburg, Neb., to John and Kay (Schultheiss) Schurr of Farnam, Neb. He graduated from Medicine Valley High School in 1991 at Curtis, Neb. He was active in 4-H, enjoyed livestock projects and was on a nationally recognized livestock judging team.

Wayne graduated from Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, Mo., in 1995 with an aviation business administration degree. After college he moved to Maywood and became involved in the family farming and purebred cattle business in Maywood and Farnam, where he established his own herd of purebred Angus and Charolais cattle.

He was well-known for his mischievous smile and sense of humor. Wayne had an uncanny sense of getting right to the point. He had a special way with animals and enjoyed all kinds. He also liked everything that had horsepower. Wayne liked riding his Harley and being free, as well as all types of firearms. We will always remember that Wayne was the same happy person every day with a heart of gold and lots of patience.

Wayne was a member of Saint John's Lutheran Church in Eustis, Neb., a life member since 1980 of the American Angus Association, a member of the American Charolais Association and a member of the pit crew on the Werkmeister Racing Team.

Survivors include his parents; brothers Marty and Ryan; his love, Sarah Prochaska; grandmother Estella Tillotson; numerous aunts and uncles; 20 first cousins; his former wife, Jennifer Werkmeister; lots of extended family; many, many friends; and Hank, the cow dog.

John Pontif, 73, Lecompte, La., died Sept. 13.

John received his bachelor's degree from Louisiana State University in 1961 and his master's degree in 1963. In 1964, he was appointed instructor with LSU-Alexandria. His principal responsibility was management of the livestock testing station at Dean Lee Research Station. He was promoted to assistant professor in 1968. He was promoted to associate professor in 1977 and to professor in 1987. John was hard-working and did an outstanding job of managing the livestock testing station and conducting beef cattle and swine research for almost 34 years. He retired Aug. 30, 1998.

John was a kind and loving husband, father and grandfather. He considered his sisters-in-law and brother-in-law his own family; Brenda his coffee-drinking buddy, Marie his casino buddy, Johnnie his gardening buddy, and Sam his true friend until the very end.

James "Jim" Taylor, 81, Elk City, Okla., died Sept. 16 at Great Plains Regional Hospital as a result of an ATV accident.

Jim was born Oct. 20, 1929, at Oklahoma City, Okla., to John and Maude (Wallace) Taylor. In August of 1933, he moved with his parents and brother to a ranch south of Mountain View, Okla., in the Wichita Mountains, where he was raised.

He completed high school at Cooperton, Okla., and received a bachelor's degree in animal husbandry at Oklahoma A&M College (now Oklahoma State University), graduating in 1951. Jim was then called to active duty in the U.S. Army, serving with the Third Infantry Division in Korea. He was honorably discharged as a First Lieutenant.

After his military service they moved to a ranch north of Berlin, Okla., where they raised commercial and registered cattle, which has been a vocation and an avocation. Jim was active in Farm Bureau, cattle organizations, the Presbyterian Church and numerous civic organizations. He was inducted into the Western Oklahoma Hall of Fame. He was also active in all branches of Masonry, and had served as Department Commander of the Grand Encampment of the Knights Templar, as well as offices in other national Masonic organizations.

In addition to his wife, Jim is survived by sons Jimmy and John; daughter Jane; seven grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

The citizen of the West, selected by a committee of community leaders, is an annual award given to individuals who embody the spirit and determination of the western pioneer, and who are committed to perpetuating the West's agricultural heritage and ideals.

Cheney, a native of Wyoming and former second lady of the United States, is an author and scholar. She served under presidents Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush as chair of the National Endowment for the Humanities. She also has ties to Colorado, having earned a bachelor's degree from Colorado College and a master's degree from the University of Colorado-Boulder. Her doctorate is from the University of Wisconsin.

From 1995 to 1998, she served as the co-host of the Sunday edition of CNN's *Crossfire*, and she has been a member of several boards of directors. She wrote six best-selling history books for children and their families, beginning with *America: A Patriotic Primer*, released in 2002, and most

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recently publishing *We the People: The Story* of *Our Constitution* in 2008.

She and her childhood sweetheart and husband, Dick Cheney, have two daughters and seven grandchildren.
