KK Duncan & Son, Zanesville, Ohio, has been honored by the American Angus Association with the Historic Angus Herd Award.

Christmas came a day late for William Duncan in 1949. His parents, Kenneth and Mildred Duncan, purchased their Angus herd's foundation females Dec. 26, 1949. The Granger Bros., Jack and Jim, also from Zanesville, bred the two cows and heifer calf. William Duncan raised the cattle as 4-H projects, and because of his efforts, was recognized as an FFA State Farmer in 1957.

The family joined the American Angus Association in 1951, surpassing 60 years of raising Angus cattle. Through the years, KK Duncan & Son was recognized with many other awards and showring honors. Today, William and his son, Al, manage 15 head, and some of the cattle are descendants of the original mother cow.

The Historic Angus Herd Award is presented to Angus breeders or immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered-Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

Jack Reich, formerly of Zap, N.D., was posthumously honored by the North Dakota Stockmen's Association (NDSA) with its highest honor, the Top Hand Award, at the NDSA Annual Convention & Trade Show Sept. 28 in Bismarck, N.D.

The award recognized Reich's unselfish concern for humanity, his country and the cattle industry, and his many contributions to the NDSA and the ranching industry before his untimely death in November 2012. Only 19 others have received the honor in the organization's 84-year history.

Reich served as an NDSA District 4 director before being the organization's vice president and later president in 2008. During his tenure as president from 2008 to 2010, the North Dakota Stockmen's Foundation was launched and, with partners, offered more than \$50,000 in disaster relief to cattle producers who were devastated by the floods and blizzards of 2009. Reich was also instrumental in establishing important international relationships for North Dakota's beef industry, welcoming foreign investors who were considering establishing large-

scale processing facilities in the region and helping facilitate trade with contacts in Kazakhstan. He lobbied for livestock industry interests in Washington, D.C., and was North Dakota's representative on the National Cattlemen's Beef Association's (NCBA) Board of Directors for two years.

Reich married Mardee Williams of Eudora, Kan., May 3, 1996. The couple went on to have three children — Vander; Kaydee, now 8; and Will, now 4 — and to build a reputable registered Angus herd, Reich Angus, together on a ranch south of Zap.

His life and that of 10-year-old Vander were cut short when, on Nov. 6 last year, they were involved in a head-on collision in southeastern Minnesota. The family was returning home from Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., where Vander had undergone surgery for a newly diagnosed cancerous brain tumor. Reich was just 43.

The tragedy bereaved the NDSA family and people across the country who had come to know the pair, maybe at a national cattlemen's meeting or another industry event, and were likely greeted by Reich with a firm handshake and a big, mustached grin.

The award was presented to Mardee Reich during the annual banquet. Reich had been a member of the American Angus Association since 1996.

Robert Folske, Bowman, N.D., was named by the NDSA as an honorary member at its annual convention and trade show in Bismarck.

Folske has been a member of NDSA for 46 years. He served on the NDSA board of directors from 1984 to 1992, as well as the Slope County Fair Board. Folske and his wife, Dora, live on the family farm and ranch that was homesteaded by Folske's grandfather in 1907. He raised purebred Angus cattle and owned a crop-spraying business, Folske's Flying Service, for 35 years.

Since retirement, Folske now raises commercial Angus cattle and rents his farmland to his nephew. One of Folske's passions is the Western way of life. He is a wheelwright and restores old wagons and buggies. Folske enjoys taking his team, wagons and buggies to area events, giving hayrides and taking part in wagon trains.

Folske has been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1964.
