Hoover Angus Farm, Tingley, Iowa, is celebrating its 80th year of breeding Angus cattle. The original farm was homesteaded by Hoover ancestors in 1856. F.W. and Sadye Hoover founded the Angus operation in 1928, and the herd is currently owned and operated by second-generation John and Barb Kiburz, third-generation David and Joy McFarland, and fourth-generation Landi McFarland.

Jack Reich, Zap, N.D., is the new North Dakota Stockmen's Association (NDSA) president. Reich; his wife, Mardi; and their children, Vander and Kaydee, operate a registered Angus ranch in partnership with his dad, Delvin, near the Knife River.

Tom Adams Jr., 82, Albuquerque, N.M., died June 10.

Tom was born Jan. 1, 1926, in Temple, Texas, and graduated from Baylor University with a degree in journalism. After residing in San Antonio, Texas, for most of his life he moved to Albuquerque in his later years to be close to his daughters. He worked as a journalist briefly at *The Cattleman* magazine, subsequently selling land and cattle across the globe.

Tom is survived by daughters Holly and Erin and three grandchildren.

Samuel Hoeper, 99, Grandview, Mo., died Aug. 28.

Samuel was born in Rich Hill, Mo., Aug. 18, 1909. After graduating from Rich Hill High School, he attended Central Missouri State Teacher's College in Warrensburg, Mo. Upon graduation he became a teacher and coach at Grandview High School.

In 1934, he completed his master's degree in high school administration at the George Peabody College and Vanderbilt University. That same year he became the high school principal and coach at Belton High School. In 1936, he was appointed the principal and director of athletics at Savannah High School in Savannah, Mo.

In 1940 he was accepted to Creighton University Medical School. Upon graduation he completed his internship at Kansas City General Hospital.

He served in the U.S. Army from 1944-1946 at Fort Meade, Md. After an honorable discharge, he began practicing medicine at Santa Fe Hospital in Topeka, Kan. In 1947, he opened his private practice in Grandview, Mo. He started Grandview Medical Center and continued there until he retired in fall

He was a member of the medical staff at Saint Joseph Hospital, Trinity Lutheran Hospital, Menorah Hospital and Research Medical Center. He was a member of the American Medical Association and the Missouri State Medical Association. He was a past president of the Industrial Medical Association and the Richards Gebaur Community Council.

He was a member of the Grandview School Board for 17 years. He was a charter member of the Grandview Lions Club and the Ruskin Heights Lutheran Church. He was a life member of the American Angus Association since 1957, dispersing the Hoeper Angus herd Oct. 15, 1966.

In 1993, he was the recipient of the Creighton University School of Medicine Alumni award.

Samuel is survived by son Sam, daughter Patricia, six grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren.

David Finnestad, 60, Belvidere, Ill., died Oct 20 at OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center after a sudden illness.
