Carolyn Gazda was recognized as the 2017 Georgia CattleWoman of the Year by the Georgia CattleWomen's Association (GCWA).

Carolyn and her husband, David, reside on their farm outside of Athens where they maintain a herd of registered Angus and commercial cattle.

Carolyn was raised in Gwinnett County, Ga., where she was highly involved in the livestock program from a young age. The daughter of a county extension agent, she showed everything she could get her hands on. It was cattle that stuck with her.

In addition to her involvement in the

junior livestock program, Carolyn was an active 4-H member. She went on to attend the University of Georgia–Athens (UGA), where she received a bachelor's degree in animal science. It was also at UGA where she met her future husband. They graduated from UGA in 1983, got married and moved to Texas soon thereafter.

Carolyn furthered her education at Stephen F. Austin State University in



Nacogdoches, Texas, where David was managing the beef unit. The couple returned to Athens where David's father ran a small registered Angus herd. In 1988, David began working as a regional manager for the American Angus Association, a position he still holds today.

Carolyn and David have two daughters, Katie and Taylor, who were both active in the Georgia junior livestock program.

Carolyn has been heavily involved in the Angus industry since she was an exhibitor herself. As she aged out of the junior program, she continued to be active in the Georgia Angus Association (GAA), serving as executive secretary, director, vice president and eventually president. She and her family were also named the GAA Family of the Year in the mid-90s. Currently, she is an active member of the American Angus Auxiliary.

As a product of the junior livestock program, Carolyn has been a loyal and selfless cheerleader of all juniors.

In 2001, Carolyn and David were named the Clarke-Oconee Cattlemen of the Year. The following year, they were named the Georgia Cattlemen's Association Purebred Cattlemen of the Year. The couple received the Clarke-Oconee Cattlemen's Association Environmentalist Award in 2004. Carolyn served in many leadership roles within the Clarke-Oconee Cattlemen's Association, including vice president and president. She is currently a director for the Oglethorpe County Cattlemen's Association.

In addition to her involvement on the county level, Carolyn has been an active member of the GCWA, which she has served as vice president. She has also participated in the Georgia Cattlemen's Association Emerging Leaders Conference.

While Carolyn's involvement in the cattle industry may seem to take up all of her time, she still manages to be involved in

After love of family, his greatest passion was supporting the beef cattle industry. He held various offices in the Indiana Angus Association and was a mentor to many young people in their agricultural careers.

Jack is survived by his wife of 53 years, Martha (Moran) Sweeney; daughter Susan; sons John and Tom; granddaughters McKenzie and Heather; and several nieces and nephews.

Judith "Judy" Herbster, 62, Falls City, Neb., died May 2 in Falls City.

Judy was born April 2, 1955, in WaKeeney, Kan., to Robert Wagg and Doris (Armbruster Wagg) Peterson. Judy spent her childhood in Ogallah, Kan.

Judy loved children, and was a daycare provider upon her 1973 graduation from Trego Community High School in WaKeeney until she became a Conklin Co. distributor in 1979. Little did she know her decision to join Conklin would change her life forever.

Judy met her husband, Charles W. Herbster, through the company she already loved. They were married June 26, 1982, at Christview Christian Church in Tulsa, Okla.

To say Judy was passionate about Conklin was an understatement. She was a champion of the business and paved the way for women in the company. Judy was the first woman President's Club member in 1980; the first female director in 1982; the first Conklin director to develop five directors in one year; and the first woman to receive the "Director of the Year" Award in 1985. A role model for many, Judy became the first and only woman president of the Conklin Co. in its 48-year history. Seeing the potential in the corporation, Charles and Judy purchased the company in 1992. Soon after, she was appointed president and COO and served as such until her passing.

In addition to her involvement with Conklin, she worked hand in hand with Charles at their companies, Herbster Angus Farms Inc. and Carico Farms Inc. of Falls City. All three operations are rooted deeply in agriculture, and Judy was dedicated and instrumental to their unparalleled success.

Judy said recently: "Live every day with no regrets." She put her heart into everything, including cooking meals for the farm family, inspiring corporate excellence and caring for those in need.
