The Nelson family was honored at the Minnesota Angus Banquet March 14 in Rochester, Minn., for breeding cattle for 100 years.

Their story begins in 1855 when Nels Oleson came from Norway and settled in Nevada Township in Mower County, Lyle, Minn. At the time, there were so many Olesons that he changed his last name to Nelson. Nels Nelson sired Helmer Nelson, who followed in his father's footsteps as a Mower County farmer. He, in turn, sired Newell Nelson, the founder of Nelson Angus Farm, also known as Beaver Brook Angus. The original property, still in the family ownership 162 years later, consisted of 180 Newell purchased his first Angus bull in 1914 from Henry Lenz at Lyle, Minn. Another Lenz bull that was used early in the program was Vica's Frank, who sired the first registered Angus cattle Newell recorded.

Newell purchased his first registered Angus females in 1917 at the Minnesota State Angus Sale at the University of Minnesota campus in Saint Paul. He brought them back to Lyle on a train.

Newell became a lifetime member of the American Angus Association Feb. 22, 1921.

Newell and his wife, Bellena, are both deceased, but their son Lorimer carries the herd on today. Lorimer was born Nov. 27, 1932. He became a member of the American Angus Association March 31, 1955

On June 13, 1964, the Minnesota Angus Field Day was hosted at the Nelson farm featuring speakers Bob Jacobs, University of Minnesota; Dean Hurlbut, American Angus Association, Saint Joseph, Mo.; Vern Kerchberger, American Angus Association, Sioux Falls, S.D.; Tom Burke, president of the Minnesota Junior Angus Association, Blooming Prairie, Minn.; and Minnesota Junior Angus Association officers Richard Leary, Caledonia, Minn., and Dean Denzer, Le Sueur, Minn. A crowd of 250 Angus enthusiasts attended.

Over the years, Newell and Lorimer participated in the Midwest Fat Steer Show sponsored by the Hormel Co. at the Mower County Fair in Austin, Minn.

In the 1950s and 1960s large drafts of females from the farm were sold to the Equen Plantation at Minter City, Miss., and to the Rocky Creek Ranch at LaGrange, Texas. They also sold cattle in the North Iowa Angus Association Sale, and the program was responsible for starting many programs in the registered Angus business and supplying many commercial bulls with their private-treaty program.

In 1967 the Nelsons bred and exhibited the reserve grand champion bull, Brookmere 1032, at the Sioux Empire Angus Sale in Sioux Falls, S.D.

The Nelson farm had a unique location in that it was located next to the city limits on the east side of Lyle, right on the Minnesota-Iowa state line. Lorimer and Sandy were married in 1978; the blended family consisted

Dr. Dan was a member of Colbert Baptist Church where he served as deacon and teacher of the Dan Daniel Sunday School class for more than 40 years. He loved Angus cattle and was a partner with his son Randy in Partisover Ranch near Colbert.

He is survived by daughters Dannette and Pam; son Randy; five grandchildren; soon to be five great-grandchildren; a host of nieces and nephews; and special caregivers.

Samuel Hay Jr., 85, Covington, Ga., died May 20 in Covington.

He was born in Opelika, Ala., March 26,1932, the third child and only son of Frances (Dearing) Hay and the Reverend Samuel Hay, pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Covington from 1923 until 1926. Sam spent the first 16 years of his life in Auburn, "The Loveliest Village On The Plains," and learned "War Eagle!" early on, witnessing many Auburn football games at a tender age.

He became a handsome gridiron star at Auburn High and Tuscaloosa High in Tuscaloosa, Ala., where he supported his father's presidency of Stillman College during the civil rights era. Following graduation from Tuscaloosa High, he went to Auburn University on a football scholarship. A back injury during his freshman year ended his playing time, although he continued to serve as an enthusiastic team manager while majoring in animal husbandry.

Following graduation from Auburn in 1955, Sam returned to his mother's family farm in Covington. In 1959 he married Louly Fowler of Covington. Making their lifelong home in Covington, Sam and Louly became parents of four children: Buncie, Sam III, Florence and Louly.

For more than 50 years Sam farmed in Newton County, with a dairy herd in his

O.G. (Dan) Daniel, Colbert, Ga., died at his home May 18. He was the son of Leonard and Martha (White) Daniel. Born in Paris, Ark., he attended public school there, graduating from Paris High School in 1940. Following his graduation from Arkansas State Teachers College, he served in the Armed Forces during World War II. He then received a bachelor's degree in animal science from the University of Maryland in 1949 and his master's and doctoral degrees from Oklahoma State University (OSU) in 1957.

He served as associate professor of animal science and then Dean of Agriculture at Panhandle A&M College in Goodwell, Okla. In 1958, he was appointed head of the University of Georgia (UGA) Extension Animal Science Department, and he retired as chairman of the Division of Animal Science in 1981.

Dr. Dan, as he was affectionately known to thousands of 4-H Club members and others throughout the cattle industry, was an innovator and organizer. During his time at UGA, he revitalized the 4-H livestock program, formed the Beef Cattle Improvement Association, acted as official judge at livestock shows in more than 22 states, and supervised the activities of more than 40 animal scientists engaged in teaching, research and extension work.

His many awards and honors include Alpha Zeta, AG Hon, Ag Alumni Hall of Fame, Georgia Agricultural Hall of Fame, Georgia Angus Hall of Fame, Georgia younger years, followed by a registered Angus herd for the remainder of his life. He received many awards and was elected to positions in the field of agriculture, including the highest-performing dairy herd in Georgia and president of the Georgia Cattleman's Association, which named him to its Hall of Fame in 2014. He also served as director of the Georgia Agribusiness Council and founding director of the Georgia Agri-Trust. Sam had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1978.

Sam was active in agricultural

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construction and equipment sales and service throughout the 1960s and 1970s and later founded Sunbelt Builders Inc., specializing in commercial construction. The business received the Covington/Newton County Chamber of Commerce Dick James Small Business of the Year Award in 1999. In 2007, Sam received the R.O. Arnold Award for highest community service. He was also an active member of the Covington Kiwanis Club and was recognized in 1995-1996 as Kiwanian of the Year.

One of Sam's most pivotal roles in the Newton County community was his service as a member of the Newton County Board of Education from 1970 until 1982. With a passion for social justice, he provided leadership when the Newton County public schools were integrated, acting as a mediator among community leaders to effect change.

Sam served as a ruling elder of the Presbyterian Church (USA) for more than 50 years on the local, Presbytery, and General Assembly levels. As a visionary leader of First Presbyterian Church of Covington, he chaired many expansion and community outreach endeavors.

In addition to his his wife, Sam is survived

by daughters Sarah "Buncie," Florence and Louly; son Samuel III; sister Martha; seven grandchildren; cousins John Dearing and Lin Dearing; many nieces and nephews special to him; and his beloved English Springer Spaniel, Lucky.
