The NAADA Front Line Award is presented to an administrative support staff of a NAADA member's alumni, development (fundraising) or student services office to recognize that individual's initiative, teamwork and ability to work effectively with the public, in addition to how they helped advance the programs or relationships within the organization, and strengthened relationships externally with friends, donors and supporters. Only one Front Line Award is given nationally by the NAADA each year.

Tammy Bartholomew of Archie, Mo., was honored by the 2014 Missouri State Fair as an outstanding female agriculturalist with the contest title of Missouri Woman in Agriculture. **Ashlyn Richardson** of Lincoln, Mo., received the title of Missouri Woman in Agriculture Rising Star. Each winner will receive a \$1,000 cash donation from Monsanto, sponsor of the second annual contest, for a nonprofit organization of her choice.

"The Missouri Woman in Agriculture Contest offers the opportunity to recognize the outstanding achievements women make in our state's number one industry," Missouri State Fair Director Mark Wolfe said. "The two women receiving top honors this year have demonstrated leadership in agriculture, a commitment to advance agriculture and extensive State Fair participation."

Bartholomew, the winner of the 31-year-old and older age division, is a retired agriculture education teacher and FFA advisor, and has served as the first female president of the Missouri Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. She has been actively involved in several other agriculture-related groups, including the National and Missouri Cattlemen's associations, and the American and Missouri Angus associations. She; her husband, Steve; daughters Hannah Bartholomew and Rachel Kagay; and son-in-law Bryant Kagay raise registered-Angus cattle.

Bartholomew has been active in the Missouri State Fair for many years, as an agriculture educator, Cass County Farm Family representative and exhibitor. The Missouri FFA Leadership Fund will be the agriculture-related beneficiary of the \$1,000 donation sponsored by Monsanto. Bartholomew has been a member of the American Angus Association since 2002.

Richardson, winner of the 18-30-year-old age division, is a senior at the University of Missouri–Columbia studying agriculture education-leadership and serves as a College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources (CAFNR) student ambassador. She is an active member of Missouri FFA and 4-H, serving as an officer in each of those organizations. Richardson has attended the Missouri State Fair each year of her life, participating through 4-H and FFA and exhibiting cattle.

Richardson was a National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) member and is now a member of the American Angus Association.

New to the contest this year were awards for second-place in each age division. Receiving second in the 31-year-old and over age division was Marilyn Calvin of Mount Vernon. Receiving second in the 18-30-year-old age division was Ashley Bauer of Warrenton.

Theodore "Ted" Griswold, 93,

Livingston, Wis., died April 23 at the University of Wisconsin (UW) Hospital in Madison.

The son of Theodore and Delphia Griswold, Ted was born Aug. 4, 1920, in the township of Clifton. He married Dolores Beerkircher in 1941 and graduated from the University of Wisconsin–Madison College of Agriculture in 1942.

Ted had a long and productive career in the cattle industry. In 1960, he bought his first herd of Angus cattle. In 1971 he had the international grand champion Angus bull in Chicago. In the mid-1970s he bred, raised and showed the grand champion carload of bulls at the Denver livestock show. In 1976, Griswold Cattle Co. was named the premier

breeder at the national heifer show. Ted had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1977.

He was a renowned cattleman, livestock breeder and steward of the land. He leaves behind a legacy of community service, having served as the first president of the Iowa-Grant School District, as well as a candidate for the Wisconsin State Senate.

Ted is survived by his wife of 73 years, Dolores; sons Joe and Patrick; daughters Linda, Kathy and Mary; 15 grandchildren; 22 great-grandchildren; and a special nephew, Chris Kupper.

Richard Wiggins, 70, Ashburn, Ga., died July 3 at his home following an extended illness.

He was the son of Henry and Frankie (Ireland) Wiggins, and was born in Turner County, where he lived and worked all of his life.

A member of the Ashburn First Baptist Church, he was also a 1962 graduate of Turner County High School and an avid horse lover.

He was a partner in the longtime family business, Turner County Stockyard, since 1960. He was a longtime member of the American Quarterhorse and Livestock Marketing associations, as horses and livestock were his love.

He is survived by his wife, Deborah (Thomas) Wiggins; his mother; sons Allen and Kim; sisters Carline and Linda; brother Dale; four grandchildren; and stepchildren Lanay, Layla and Lace.

Raymond "Ray" Nyswonger, 74, Reno, Nev., died July 8 in Reno.

Born Sept. 3, 1939, to Marvin and Eleanor Nyswonger in Indianola, Iowa, Ray attended Indianola High School, graduating in 1958. After attending Central Missouri College in Warrensburg and Iowa State University in Ames he followed his dream, showing and raising cattle.
