Chandler Mulvaney, Opelika, Ala., was one of the Agriculture Future of America (AFA) 40 Chances Fellows program members who traveled to the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches Center in August to discuss what can be done about the issue of hunger in this country and in the rest of the world. Mulvaney is also on the AFA student advisory team for Auburn University and is a former National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) member.

Inspired by a grant from the Howard G. Buffett Foundation and its 40 Chances awareness campaign, the grant was given to AFA to support 40 freshman students through its four-year leader development program. Since the grant, the 40 Chances Fellows program expanded to provide additional opportunities based on AFA's areas of programmatic focus, as well as exploration of agriculture and world hunger.

Now in their senior year of college, in 2016 these Fellows will travel in groups of 10 to one of four countries in varying stages of development to observe the impacts of agriculture policies and hunger on a world stage. By participating in both domestic- and global-hunger and food-security experiences, this group of students will be prepared to become compassionate and knowledgeable leaders for the agriculture industry.

The AFA was founded in 1996 by R. Crosby Kemper Jr. and other agri-business leaders in Kansas City, Mo. AFA offers leader and career development training and community-based academic scholarships for college men and women pursuing a career in an agriculture-related field.

INDUSTRY EXTRAS

Zoetis has announced its completion of an expansion of its global manufacturing and supply facility in Lincoln, Neb., to help meet the demand for Synovex® implants. The new 19,000-square-foot, three-story facility will house the global manufacturing operations for the implant, which helps improve gain and feed efficiency in beef cattle.

In 2014, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) granted a label extension for Synovex Choice® for use in heifers, and also completed an environmental impact review of the implant. The FDA evaluated and approved data from in-depth environmental modeling studies completed by Zoetis, which examined exposure of the active ingredients and their metabolites. The studies also evaluated direct impact of these ingredients. The FDA issued Zoetis a FONSI (finding of no significant impact) on the environmental assessment, including waterways, air, plants or aquatic species, when used according to label directions.

Cogent Breeding Ltd. (Cogent) has acquired Foundation Genetics, a specialist Canadian bovine genetics business. Following the completion of the acquisition, the management team, sales and operational staff at Foundation Genetics will trade under the Cogent name. Dave Brand will remain as general manager of the acquired business in Canada, reporting to Stuart Boothman, Cogent's international operations manager.

Jacqueline Smith, epidemiology section chief for the University of Kentucky (UK) Veterinary Diagnostic Lab (VDL) in the UK College of Agriculture, Food and Environment, was awarded an honorary diploma by the American Veterinary Epidemiology Society at the annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association in Boston.

The society annually awards the honorary diploma to up to 10 recipients who have made significant contributions to veterinary epidemiology.
