Radale Tiner, American Angus
Association regional manager for Texas,
New Mexico and Louisiana, was recently
elected president of the Texas Purebred
Cattle Alliance (TPCA). The statewide
organization was formed to establish
an alliance of all purebred breeders and
associations to promote and protect the
seedstock cattle industry in Texas. The group
is also concerned with improving production
techniques and the conditions involved with
raising purebred cattle.

The TPCA promotes educational programs and activities to protect the beef industry and the high-quality product farmers and ranchers supply. The group works closely with the Texas Animal Health Commission, the Texas Department of Agriculture, the USDA and their representatives on animal health issues and marketing seedstock cattle. The TPCA also cooperates with the Texas Beef Council, the U.S. Beef Breeds Council and the American Dairy Council in efforts to improve the purebred cattle industry.

The TPCA promotes marketing ideas, international and domestic trade and encourages better communication among the purebred cattle breeders and their associations. The TPCA provides greater unity within the purebred cattle industry to affect a more reasonable and effective way for purebred cattle breeders to deal with legislation applicable to the cattle industry.

Members of the 2014-2015 TPCA officer team are President Radale Tiner, American Angus Association; First Vice President Jason Bates, International Brangus Breeders Association; Second Vice President John Ford, Santa Gertrudis Breeders International; and Secretary-treasurer Collin Osbourn, Beefmaster Breeders United.

Blase Angus Farm has been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1970.

He was adamant about protecting the upper North Platte Valley's vital and historic water rights. A rare cancer claimed his life in December 2006.

The Stock Growers Land Trust and Laura Bucholz created the Kurt Bucholz Conservation Award in 2008 to be presented annually to an individual who exemplifies Kurt's conservation values, particularly those that center on protecting and nourishing Wyoming's working ranches.

De Roy Forwoodson, 80, Wilburton, Okla., died June 23 after a long and courageous battle with cancer.

De Roy was born Sept. 20, 1933, in Wilburton to Amos and Jewell Forwoodson. He grew up in Wilburton and graduated in 1951. He served his country in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean Conflict, and, after his service, he attended Eastern Oklahoma State College in Wilburton and Southwestern State College in Weatherford, Okla., graduating in 1961 with a degree in pharmacy.

He married Lou Wood in 1962, and the couple moved to Wilburton in 1963 and eventually owned and operated Huskins Drug Store for 33 years. They sold the business in 1996, and he worked part-time for the Veteran's Hospital until retiring in 2013. De Roy was a very kind and cheerful person and a blessing to all who knew him.

He started his cow herd in 1968 with an Angus bull and Hereford cows, eventually purchasing Ted Ewings' registered-Angus herd in the mid-1970s. With his family he started Forwoodson Angus Ranch. He purchased cows from Belle Point, Sydenstricker, BLC, Gardiners, Dalebanks and many others to add new genetics and to improve the herd.

He started turning information in to the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®) program in the early 1980s to help make herd decisions and work to improve expected progeny differences (EPDs). He really enjoyed going to Angus sales, meeting people and seeing good cattle. He sold most of his cattle private treaty to local ranchers.

De Roy was a member of the First Christian Church, served on the Soil Conservation

Board for more than 40 years, and served and volunteered for many local organizations. De Roy had been a member of the American Angus Association since 1982. He was a pharmacist for more than 50 years and received his doctorate in pharmacy in 2001.

In addition to his wife of 52 years, De Roy is survived by sons Tim and Todd; daughter Kim; four brothers and brothers-in-law; eight sisters and sisters-in-law; eight grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

James "Jim" Strickland, also known as "Doc," Glennville, Ga., died Aug. 2 after a battle with cancer.

Doc grew up in Claxton, Ga., attended Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College (ABAC) in Tifton, Ga., and received his doctorate of veterinary medicine at the College of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Georgia (UGA). He served in the Veterinary Corp. in the U.S. Air Force. Following his service, he practiced veterinary medicine in Thomaston, Ga., for two years, and then had many years of mixed practice service in Glennville.

He also worked for UGA as an extension veterinarian. Doc was past president and a member of the Georgia Veterinary Medical Association (GVMA) and was a member of the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA). He served as past president of the Georgia Cattlemen's Association; he was a member of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, the Tattnall County Cattlemen's Association and the American Association of Bovine Practitioners.

Doc served for more than 20 years on the Tattnall County Board of Education; he was a member of the Rotary Club and a devoted member of the Glennville United Methodist Church. He was a member of the Georgia Farm Bureau for more than 40 years, having served as both county director and president of the Tattnall County Farm Bureau. In

addition, he was a member and past vice chairman of the Georgia Farm Bureau Beef Commodity Committee. He had been a life member of the American Angus Association since 1971.

Doc had been a semi-retired veterinarian, doing large- and small-animal practice work, in addition to managing the family farm, which produces commercial and purebred Angus cattle, corn, hay, pecans and timber.

Doc is survived by his beloved wife of more than 56 years, Norma; daughter Quinn; sons Jes and Monty; and grandchildren Zach, Cade, Sam and Emry.

Edith "Edee" Grinde, 90, Charlottesville, Va., died Aug. 22 at her home.




