

Angus juniors recognized as BEST winners

The 2012-2013 Ohio Cattlemen's Association (OCA) BEST (Beef Exhibitor Show Total) Program wrapped up on May 11 with its annual awards banquet hosted at the Ohio Expo Center in Columbus.

"The banquet is a time to celebrate the many achievements of our BEST participants, both in and out of the showring," says Stephanie Sindel, BEST coordinator. "Each participant is recognized for their hard work by family, friends and BEST supporters alike."

Several representatives from program sponsors Bob Evans Farms, Burroughs Frazier Farms, Farm Credit Mid-America, Green Oak Farms, M.H. Eby, Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and Weaver Livestock were on hand to help present awards totaling more than \$35,000 in belt buckles, furniture, show materials and other awards.

This year's BEST program featured 16 sanctioned shows that weaved its way across the state. More than 525 head of market animals and heifers were shown, and 355 youth participated.

The champion Angus heifer was exhibited by **Lydia Dance** of Hillsboro, Ohio. Champion Hill Georgina 8156 is a Feb. 2012 daughter of SAV Prosperity 9131 bred by Champion Hill, Bidwell, Ohio. Lydia is the daughter of Henry and Barbara Dance.

Reserve champion Angus heifer and fourth overall novice heifer belongs to **Hadley LeVan** of Woodstock, Ohio. His heifer, SSF Blackcap Style 2282, is a Feb. 2012 daughter of Silveira's Style 9303. Ethan Whiteside of Queenstown, Md., bred the heifer. Hadley is the son of Louis and Melissa LeVan.

Angus Juniors 'Raise the Bar' at Virginia Tech

The future of the American Angus Association is bright. That's because Angus juniors from across the country are participating in events to continue learning about the industry and expanding their leadership potential. National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members met May 3-5 at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va., to participate in a Raising the Bar conference.

"The Raising the Bar conferences allow Angus juniors to interact outside of the showring and learn about more in-depth beef industry issues," says Robin Ruff, American Angus Association director of junior activities. "These opportunities give them a chance to expand their knowledge outside of the everyday classroom."

Throughout the weekend, 24 Angus junior leaders, officers and advisors from seven state junior Angus associations toured Virginia Tech and area Angus operations, heard from industry experts, participated in leadership-training workshops and spent an evening bowling on campus.

Participants made stops at the Kentland Farm, where they learned about feeding different hay types during a cow's breeding cycle and fetal sexing; Daltons on the Sycamore, where they toured the Olde Dominion Agricultural Complex; and Big Spring Mill, a fifth-generation feed and flour mill.

On the Virginia Tech campus, juniors met with the Virginia Tech Beef Leadership Council about the importance of beef advocacy; heard from agricultural professor Paige Pratt about the importance of evaluating cattle with expected progeny differences (EPDs); and met with David Kohl about the optimistic future of agriculture.
