# Angus juniors win top honors at KILE livestock judging contests

Honors were awarded during the Keystone International Livestock Exposition (KILE) Collegiate and Junior Livestock Judging contests Saturday, Oct. 5, at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex and Exposition Center in Harrisburg, to Angus juniors **Levi Stephenson**, Carollton, Ky.; **Chris Hudson**, Middletown, Mo.; and **Kyle Cooney**, Union Bridge, Md.

There were 22 collegiate, 4-H and FFA teams with 107 members. They judged classes of cattle, swine and sheep and presented reasons.

Stephenson, a member of the second-highest team, Kentucky 4-H, earned top individual honors for the junior contest by scoring 832 points.

Hudson, on the University of Missouri team, scored 945 points and was the third collegiate individual. Cooney, on the Maryland 4-H team, scored 827 and was second-high junior individual.
