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competition. Global winners will be announced during ONE: The Alltech Ideas Conference (ONE18) May 23. The prizes include a fully funded doctoral position and \$5,000 USD for the global undergraduate winner and a fully funded postdoctoral position and \$10,000 USD for the global graduate winner.

Students must be nominated by a professor in order to participate and may submit scientific papers on topics such as animal health and nutrition, crop science, agriculture analytical methods, food chain safety and traceability, human health and nutrition, and other agrisciencerelated sectors. Paper submissions may be completed online through Dec. 31, 2017, and regional winners will be announced in March 2018.
