Angus scholarships increase

The Angus Foundation has increased its commitment of available scholarships for 2006 from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

Eligible Angus youth meeting the qualifications for the Foundation's 2006 Scholarship Program will be considered by the scholarship selection committee for these general scholarships. This available amount of scholarships for Angus youth is made possible by the generous financial support from Angus breeders, allied industry interests and friends of the Angus Foundation through the Angus Foundation Heifer Package, outright cash gifts and other fundraising activities.

Two \$5,000 scholarships will be given in memory of former American Angus Association executive vice president Richard "Dick" Spader. In addition, 20 \$3,000 scholarships and 30 \$1,000 scholarships will be available. Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the 2006 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in July at Indianapolis, Ind.

The eligibility requirements for these general Angus Foundation scholarships remain the same. Angus youth who are graduating from high school or are currently in college may be eligible to apply for other Angus related scholarships, such as the new Woodlawn Farms Angus Scholarship, National Junior Angus Association/Certified Angus Beef (NJAA/CAB) Scholarship and others that are permanently endowed and managed by the Angus Foundation.

NJAA members earn Bronze and Silver

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP), which the American Angus Association began in 1972. To receive these honors, junior Angus members must apply for the awards and meet point requirements in many areas of participation.

Applicants are evaluated in the areas of junior Angus association activities, participation in showmanship and leadership events, use of performance testing to improve their herds, and progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

While the Bronze and Silver awards are presented to members throughout the year, Angus Productions Inc. (API) publishes summaries of the award winners in the May and September youth-focused issues of the *Angus Journal*.
