## **NJAA** members earn Bronze and Silver

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP), which the American Angus Association began in 1972. To receive these honors, junior Angus members must apply for the awards and meet point requirements in many areas of participation.

Applicants are evaluated in the areas of junior Angus association activities, participation in showmanship and leadership events, use of performance testing to improve their herds, and progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

While the Bronze and Silver awards are presented to members throughout the year, Angus Productions, Inc. ## KILE Junior Beef Exhibitor Scholarship now available

The Keystone International Livestock Exposition (KILE) Beef Committee has announced the availability of the 2009 KILE Junior Beef Exhibitor Scholarship. The Committee will award two cash scholarships — in the amount of \$500 and \$1,000 — to outstanding youth who have previously exhibited beef cattle at KILE. A percentage of the funds raised from the Youth Beef Benefit Auction at the 2008 KILE have been dedicated to the Junior Beef Exhibitor Scholarship. This is the third year the scholarship will be awarded, and all eligible youth are encouraged to apply.

Applicants must have exhibited beef cattle in the Junior Beef Show at KILE in 2006 or later and must be enrolled in a degree (undergraduate or graduate) or certification program at a post-secondary educational institution. Awards will be based on academics, community leadership, agricultural activities, and KILE involvement.

The two recipients will be recognized at the 2009 Keystone International Livestock Exposition, Saturday, Oct. 3, at the Youth Beef Benefit Auction. This year's KILE will take place Sept. 29-Oct. 4 at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex & Expo Center in Harrisburg, Pa.
