If you watch television on Friday nights, you may have viewed the ABC network TV series, "What Would You Do?" The show hosted by John Quinones asks the viewing audience what they would do in a particular situation. The program presents a scenario with actors creating a controversial situation recorded on hidden cameras. The innocent bystander reacts to the social or unethical situation, and the host reveals that the problem was staged to view their reaction. What is character? Character is defined as the combination of qualities or features that



distinguished one person, group or thing from another. Thinking of character reminds me of my 4-H career and the Pillars of Character. The Pillars of Character consist of six aspects: trustworthiness,

Trustworthiness includes being honest

in everything you do; having the courage to do what is right, even when it seems difficult; and being reliable when you need to do something by following through to accomplish it.

- ▶ **Respect** is following the Golden Rule treating others as you would want to be treated. Understand differences in other people. Be considerate and peaceful in stressful situations.
- ► **Responsibility** is being accountable for your actions, words and attitudes. Always set a good example. Use selfdiscipline, self-control and plan ahead.
- Fairness includes playing by the rules, being open-minded and listening to others, and treating everyone fairly.
- **Caring** is being kind and compassionate in all your actions.
- ► **Citizenship** is doing your part to make the community and the world better.

The National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) has an outstanding junior membership. It's not the quantity but the quality of the juniors that counts. The main goal of the NJAA is to influence juniors to achieve positive character development and skills through contests and Angus projects and to set a standard for the future of the Angus breed.

We, the junior membership, need to remember our character while showing, competing or representing our association. Encompassing all the six Pillars of Character values help to raise our level of character. However, when we don't utilize our positive character values, our actions can adversely affect our character and possibly create a negative long-lasting blemish on our lives.

In life, your character will affect you. Remember the quote:

Watch your thoughts, for they become words.

Watch your words, for they become actions. Watch your actions, for they become habits. Watch your habits, for they become character.

Watch your character, for it becomes your destiny.

In trying times, we need to represent ourselves and the association to secure the future of our Angus breed through each of our individual characters. So, will you stand up or look the other way?

# NJAA members earn Bronze and Silver

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP), which the American Angus Association began in 1972. To receive these honors, junior Angus members must apply for the awards and meet point requirements in many areas of participation.

Applicants are evaluated in the areas of junior Angus association activities, participation in showmanship and leadership events, use of performance testing to improve their herds, and progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.
