

The new era of marketing

The face of marketing, agricultural products or otherwise, has changed drastically during the past few years. Unfortunately, some are less informed or even intimidated by these new methods, when, in fact, they are not all that different from the original cattle sale format of running cattle through a salering or facility!

New marketing methods

The first method that comes to mind is not new at all, but it is becoming a pretty regular occurrence with club-calf breeders, especially in the Midwest - the private-



treaty bid-off. This is a very self-explanatory format; you submit a bid on an animal or animals that you are interested in and then are informed by the owners when you have been "knocked out" by someone taking the next bid higher on

the same animal. This process continues

until one bidder says no and the other is proclaimed the "winner" of the calf.

The next method is also not very new, but it has helped breeders all over the country sell more cattle to different areas — Internet broadcast and live video bidding. This sales option uses the regular

format of running cattle through a salering, though webcams and microphones are set up to record the action and broadcast it via the Internet. All you, as a potential buyer, have to do is sit in your easy chair at home. You can partake in the auction as if you were sitting front and center in the bleachers.

One of my personal favorites is the video auction, where the cattle are available for viewing outside the sale facility. It is set up just like a "normal auction," but instead of running the animals through a ring, you simply show video and pictures of them on TVs or projectors. This format is a little more expensive for the seller, but is much more efficient and less stressful on everyone involved when actual sale day rolls around.

The next couple, to me, go hand-in-hand: Internet auctions and private selling over

certain pages; for example, Steer Shop, Heifer Shop, etc. These two types are the newest and are gaining much momentum and popularity with many top breeders. They are cost-effective, and management and stress levels are minimal. Though, if you

do decide to use one of these types, it would probably be in your best interest to talk to
