Perhaps the greatest aspect of livestock judging is the ability to teach self-confidence. Even when a class is challenging, students must take a stand for their own priorities and then go look an official in the eye and defend their placing in the reasons room. By being coached in reasons, they also enhance their public speaking skills, learn how to project their voice and emphasize key points to really

bring their message home. It's apparent when being interviewed, delivering presentations or even just talking in groups who has had reasons experience.

Every contest has its own unique twist that throws a new challenge at students. Meat animal evaluation contests are a great example. This event uniquely challenges students to understand all facets of the beef industry. Contestants are faced with breeding animal selection, which is vital to understand the traits producers seek for their operational goals. Yet, students are also asked to evaluate market animals to determine a performance rank and price, as well as call fat thickness and Longissimus muscle areas. These are crucial aspects for understanding the factors that influence profitability in the feedlot/packer sector. This contest brings real-world practicality to the forefront as students leave there recognizing what profitable livestock look like, while at the same time having a better understanding of the meats cooler.

Experiences gained from the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) prepare members for successful careers in livestock judging. Between the public speaking, career development, judging and the *Certified Angus Beef®* Cook-Off contests, members have been given an upper hand as opposed to students who were not part of an organization as focused on developing future leaders in our industry. The NJAA offers members opportunities that will assist them wherever their lives happen to lead, whether it be livestock judging or not; however, the skills we gain from this great organization boost our confidence to step out of our comfort zone and take chances that will lead to success in and out of our industry.
