Internships are a great way to start preparing for the future. This summer, I've had the incredible opportunity to serve as the summer intern for the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) in their Denver, Colo., headquarters. This internship (sponsored by the Nebraska Corn Board) has provided me a firsthand understanding about the work environment and fostered goals for my future career.

While in Denver, I worked directly with international trade teams, foreign buyers touring our various domestic harvesting plants, and have participated in several meetings discussing strategy to place our U.S. red meat products in various international markets.

Moreover, I had the opportunity to attend the annual USMEF Board of Directors meeting in Washington, D.C., where various speakers and member-led sessions discussed global market opportunities for U.S. beef, pork and lamb. Many of these sessions focused on enhancing current markets and building new trade relationships.

In addition, I traveled with the Central America USMEF Pork Trade Team to Iowa, where we attended the World Pork Expo. This internship has provided me with valuable knowledge and skills that I will use for the rest of my life. I owe this all to just one summer




